BOSTON HOUSEKEEPER'S ONE-EGG CAKE.

cup sugar, one egg beaten light, one cup sods one teaspoon cream of tarter, one teaspoon vanilla, two squares chocolate, with one tablespoon of water over hot water; bake in a square pan in a moderate oven thirty minutes. You can frost with a boiled frosting, but it is good without.

LEMON APPLE FILLED CAKE.

Cream one-fourth cupful of butter and add one cupful of sugar gradually, while beating constantly; when mixture is very creamy add two eggs well beaten and one-half cupful of milk. Mix and sift one and two-thirds cupfuls of flour with two and one-half teaspoonful of baking powder and then add this to the first mixture. When baked cut cake in halves and put together with lemon apple filling.

To make the lemon apple filling put three-fourths cupful of sugar and one tablespoonful of flour in a saucepan and stir until thoroughly mixed. Add three tablespoonfuls of lemon juice, one tablespoonful of cold water, one egg, slightly beaten, a few grains of salt and one apple, pared and grated. Place on range and bring to the boiling point, while stirring constantly. Let boil two minutes, still stirring constantly. Cool before spreading.

CHOCOLALE CRULLERS.

Sift three cupfuls of flour with three teaspoonfuls of baking powder, one cupful of sugar and oneteaspoonful of salt. Rub in one tablespoonful of butter, add two well-beaten eggs, two taspoonfu of vanil'a, one cupful of sweet milk and two onnce of melted, unsweetened chocolate. Place on a floured board, roll out, cut into rings, fry in deep, hot fat, drain and sprinkle with fine granulated sons and for comfort."

Green Tomato Marmalade.

Four pounds of green tomatos (after they are peeled), four pounds of granulated sugar, half a dozen lemons. Peel the lemons very thin the night b fore, and cut peelings up fine. L t them soak over night in plenty of cold water. After peeling and cutting up the tomatoes let themboil for one hour, the peelings of the leman also bailing for o le hour in a separate ket le. Now remove the white peel ng from the lemons, take out the seed and cut the pulp in thin slices. Put all the i igredients together and boil for twenty or thirty minutes.

A RARE MARMALADE.

This is an old and treasured recipe of a woman in South Carolina. To one quart of ripe-tomatoes, measured after the fruit has been peeled, cut up, brought to the boil and skim thoroughly [or take a two-pound can of tomatoes] take two pounds of sugar, two oranges and one lemon. Remove the pulp from the oranges and lemon with a spoon, boil the rinds. until they are tender and cut in narrow strips with a pair of scissors. Put all the ingredients on to boil slowly, stirring constantly for about two hours, or until the marmalade is thick and the strips of rind and other particles of fruit are transparent. Seal tight in small jars. Made of yellow tomatoes the marmalade is beautiful.

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Airing the Pillows

Of course, says Woman's Home Companion, every careful housewife gives her pillows a daily shaking and airing and turns the mattress to a different position, because she knows this not only ensures a comfortable night's rest, but lengthens the wearing qualities of the bedding as well.

But are you sure that you really handle your pillows to the best advantage? Do you take them from the bed and pound them vigorously and then lay them upon the window-sill to

Well, then, you are not doing it right at all.

Why do we give the pillows the daily thorough shake? You will promptly answer. "For sanitary rea-

Just so. Well, then, let us reason it out from a sanitary point of view. You have been lying upon the pillow all night and breathing into it the vitiated air from your system. Naturally the feathers near the surface are surcharged with this impure air, and, in case of disease, with dangerous germs, and therefore these feathers require the fresh air.

Now, when you pound a pillow and shake it up, you probably are pushing the impregnated feathers into the inside of the pillow, where they get little or no air at all. Then, when you make up your bed, you will, per haps, treat the pillow to a few more slaps, thus forcing these same feathers to the surface again, and at night your face will lie upon the same layer of feathers as the previous night. The chances are that you are thus inhaling impurities and endangering your health.

Therefore, to gain real sanitary benefits from the daily airing, pillows should be thoroughly beaten only after they have been aired. More than that, pillows should never be placed where the sun's rays strike them, as this has a tendency to make the feathers oily.

Once a week they should be hung upon the wash-line in a shady spot. If a windy day is selected for this, the airing will be more thorough.

By giving pillows this constant attention, the feathers will attain a state of sanitation quite in conformity with even the strictest requirements for health and comfort.
