**PARAFFIN OIL FOR CLEANING
DOORS.**

To clean finger marks on doors, rub
well with a piece of clean white flannel
dipped in paraffin oil. The marks will
disappear like magic. Afterwards, wipe
with a clean cloth wrung out of hot
water to take away the smell. This is
much better than using soap and water;
and does not injure the paint. Paraffin
oil is also excellent for cleaning varnish-
ed hall doors.

**TREATMENT OF NEW EARTHEN-
WARE.**

Many housewives relieve in boiling
new earthenware before using it, as this
effectually toughens and hardens it.
This is particularly efficacious in the
case of ordinary brown kitchenware, the
articles being placed in a large pan of
cold water, which is then brought
slowly to the boil. After being allowed
to boil for ten minutes remove the pan
and allow the water to cool before tak-
ing out the ware.

Flour Paste for Filling Cracks.
Wheat flour mixed to a good paste
with linseed oil is claimed to be an ex-
cellent filler for cracks in floors and for
loose joints to be painted over. Fill the
cracks with the paste, working it in
solid with a thin-bladed knife, smooth
even with the surface, and let get thor-
oughly dried before painting over. It
is claimed it will not work out.

Some Cooking Hints.
Meat Pies and Potomac Poisoning.
In making meat pies to be eaten cold
see that the top is ventilated by one or,
better still, two holes. Without this
precaution, potomac poison is liable to
develop, even when the meat used in the
pie appears to be perfectly fresh.

Slightly Sour Cream.
When cream is only slightly sour it
may be made delicious to served with
puddings, etc., in the following way:
Put into a basin with the juice of a le-
mon and a tablespoonful of sugar and
whip until quite stiff. This treatment
makes its excellently and increases the
quantity at the same time.

When Smoked Ham is Salty.
If smoked ham is hard and salty, slice
it and soak in water well sweetened with
molasses; let soak for an hour or two
before cooking, using enough water to
cover the slice, then rinse, dry and cook.

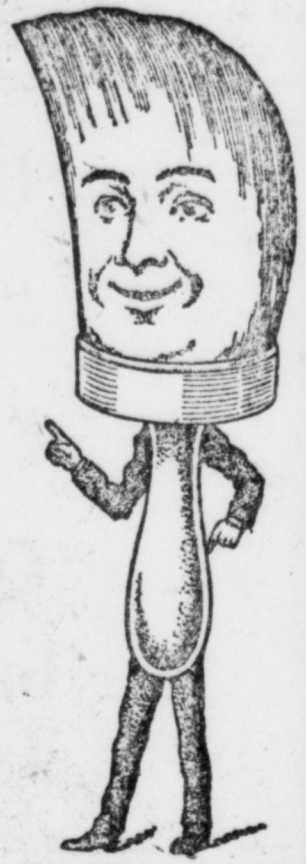
