Scott Act Matters

The Scott Act Inspector, with Chief Kelly and Constable Woolverton, made a seizure of ale at Ryan's restaurant last week and a fine of fifty dollars and costs was imposed upon the proprietor on Saturday.

On the 10th instant the Inspector got word that a man named E. E. C. who belongs to the Parish of Brighton was bringing intoxicating liquor from Victoria County into this County contrary to law in a suit case. Constable Woolverton armed with a search warrant and assisted by John Murdoch of Hartland boarded the express train coming south, and seized the suit case from Clarke. It contained 13 bottles of whiskey and 16 bottles of brandy. This was seized and brought to Woodstock.

On June 5th Inspector Colpitts, Constable Woolverton, Holyoke and John Carpenter of Bloomfield, with a search warrant, made a search at the boundary line at Bloomfield, on the premises occupied by Charles Wright formerly of the Aberdeen Hotel in Woodstock. Wright was found there occupying a hut on the American side of the line, but no liquor was found on the Province side.

About 12 o'clock on the night of the 13th inst. the Inspector got word that Homan McMullin of Wicklow had gone to Kilburn for a load of liquor. Papers were made out and Constable Woolverton with John Carpenter of Bloomfield searched McMullin's place on the boundary line at Bridgewater about 4 a. m. They found the American officers there but McMullin had come with his load and gone. It seems that the U. S. officers saw McMullin beginning to unload his wagon and thought he was on the U. S. side of the line. They were about to seize the load when they found that he was on the Canadian side. He then took his load and started up across the Hartley Settlement, through Tracy Mills, to the Good Settlement Road, and hid the liquor in several places. The Canadian officers followed the tracks of the wagon and found three bags of lager beer, and two cases of gin. This was seized and brought to Woodstock. McMullin evidently succeeded in hiding some successfully as he had a full load when he reached his place first, before he was disturbed by the U. S. officers. Informations have been laid against him and the cases will be heard in due course.

Cases are now pending against several parties at Bath for illegal selling.
