Horned Destroyer of Crops Appears in this District

A worm three inches long with horns on it is the latest destroyer of vegetables that the Provincial Department of Agriculture has to battle with.

Yesterday Mr. John W. Chase, of St. Marys, took one of the latest "bugs", of the department office and there it was looked over by Mr. R. P. Gorham the assistant horticulturist. He pronounced it a sample of the "tomato worm."

In Ontario the tomato worm has been a serious pest for years, committing great havoc with the vegetable crops and gardens in certain sections of that province. It has been found in New Brunswick before, but has not been very prevalent, nor is it now, and Mr. Gorham declares that it can be controlled by hand picking—that is picking the individual specimens off by hand as they appear and killing them.

A bulletin issued by the Department of Agriculture of Ontario describes the tomato worm as three inches long and having a horn-like structure on the last segment. The general color is light green with oblong white bands on each side. The eggs are deposited, the bulletin says, on the leaves of the tomato and potato plants and hand picking and spraying with arsenical poisons are recommended for its destruction.

The sample captured by Mr. Chase is said to have done a large amount of damage at vegetable gardens in St. Marys and this is said to have been the first appearance of the pest in this vicinity for some years, if not the first on record.
