PEACH PUFFS.
 Select three fine large peaches,
 peel, and cut them in halves.
 Make a batter as follows: Mix one
 cup of flour with one teaspoon of
 baking powder, two tablespoons
 of sugar, and quarter of a tea-
 spoon of salt, and sift into a bowl.
 Add three quarters of a cup of
 milk mixed with one egg well
 beaten, then add a tablespoonful of
 melted butter and beat into a batter.
 Brush six custard cups with
 butter. Put a half peach in each
 cup, hollow side up, and over this
 put a large spoonful of the batter.
 Bake in a hot oven for twenty
 minutes. Serve with sugar and
 thin cream.

PEACH PUDDING.
 Peel twelve ripe peaches and cut
 them in pieces, put them in a basin
 sprinkle fine sugar over and let
 them stand for an hour. Put one
 and one-half pints of milk in a
 double boiler. Before preparing
 the peaches put one ounce of gela-
 tine in a teacupful of milk and let
 it soak for an hour. Stir four
 beaten eggs with two tablespoor-
 fuls of finely powdered sugar and
 the gelatine in the milk when
 boiling, and continue stirring for
 four or five minutes. Take the
 double boiler off the fire and sea-
 son the custard with a little salt.
 Put the peaches in a glass dish,
 and when the custard has partly
 cooled pour it over and leave them
 for a few hours before serving. It
 is better to make the pudding the
 preceding day.

PEACH TURNOVERS.
 Make a rich pastry, roll it out
 one-third of an inch thick, and
 cut the rounds with a saucer. Put
 on each piece one-half teaspoon of
 sliced peaches, a tablespoonful of
 sugar and a few drops of lemon
 juice. Moisten the edges of the
 paste with white of egg, fold over
 press together, with the thumb and
 finger to make the edges evenly
 scalloped, and bake in a long bak-
 ing pan, after sifting sugar over
 the top. Serve with whipped
 cream or peach sauce.

SWEET PICKLED PEACHES.
 Use half a peck peaches, one
 pint of vinegar, two pounds of
 brown sugar, an ounce of stick
 cinnamon, and a few cloves. Boil
 the sugar, vinegar and cinnamon
 twenty minutes. Dip the peaches
 quickly in hot water, then rub
 off the "fur" with a towel. Stick
 each peach with four cloves. Put
 into the hot syrup and cook until
 the fruit is soft, using one-half of
 the peaches at a time.

PEACH TART.
 Line a pie dish with puff paste,
 put twelve half peaches at the
 bottom, dust over with two or
 three tablespoonfuls of finely
 powdered sugar; over this put six
 chopped apples, and one break-
 fast cupful of rich custard, flavo-
 red to taste, cover with more paste,
 put a piece of paper over that,
 and bake in a moderate oven.
 When done spread the top over
 with two well whipped whites of
 eggs, mixed with one tablespoonful
 of powdered sugar; over this ar-
 range preserved cherries and im-
 itation leaves cut out of angelica,
 arranging them according to fancy.
 Place the pie in the oven for a few
 minutes to set the egg, and it is

War in Balkans
 Over For Present

London, Aug 4.—The prospect
 of peace in the Balkans is now re-
 garded as good. The Bulgarians
 have accepted Roumania's proposal
 for the delimitation of the new
 frontier. The differences between
 Roumania and Bulgaria are practic-
 ally settled by this concession.

BUCHAREST, Aug. 4.—The
 Balkan peace conference is making
 steady progress, but it is hardly
 possible that a preliminary peace
 treaty can be signed by the time
 the five days' armistice expires this
 week and therefore Roumania has
 proposed a three days' extension
 of the compact. The new frontier
 between Roumania and Bulgaria,
 as agreed upon, will start twelve
 kilometres south of Baljik, a part
 of the Black Sea, run northwest-
 erly to a point twelve kilometres
 south of Dobritch and finish nine
 kilometres west of Turtukai, on
 the Danube about forty miles
 south east of Bucharest. It is
 understood the allies will abandon
 their demand for an indemnity
 from Bulgaria. The disposition of
 Kavala, in the Vilayet of Saloniki
 on the Aegean Sea, remains the
 thorniest problem with which the
 peace conference has to deal and
 may cause another war.

DETROIT'S BIG CLAIM
AGAINST UNITED
RAILWAY

Detroit, Mich., Aug. 5.—Mayor
 Marx last night announced that he
 will ask the city council tonight to
 instruct City Treasurer Koch im-
 mediately to seize sufficient Detroit
 United Railway property, power
 houses, cars, etc., to satisfy the
 city claim against the company for
 \$439,734 back taxes, and an ad-
 ditional \$10,685 due the city for
 the privilege of operating freight
 cars on Detroit streets.

DO NOT WASH SILK IN HOT WATER
 Never wash white silk in hot water
 if you want it to remain white and not
 turn yellow. Barely lukewarm suds
 (do not rub soap on the material, but
 make a suds with good laundry soap),
 almost cold rinsing water, and do not
 let either silk or pongee become dry,
 but iron while it is still damp. These
 fabrics may not be dried, then sprinkled
 as many cotton goods. The sprinkling
 will cause spots that will show after
 the garment is ironed.
