The work done is of the sort that will last for years, and he would be a foolish man who will say that the purchase of the permanent road making apparatus was not well advised. Surely they should have some pride in the appearance of the town. Anyway the city fathers are doing well by the streets this year. It is only a matter of regret that such a policy had not been adopted ten years ago.
