LONDON, April 26.—A militant suffragette "arson squad" set fire to an empty train standing on a siding of the Southwestern Railway at Lodington on the Thames, just outside of London, at an early hour this morning. Little damage was done, however, and no arrests were made.
 Quantities of oil and other combustibles, suffragette literature and post cards addressed to members of the House of Commons, were found in the car where the fire had started.

**Priests Must Not
 Ride In Autos.**

Berlin, April 25.—Roman Catholic clergymen are forbidden to either own or ride in automobiles, according to an edict published today in the Rhenish Prussian Bishopric of Treves. The head of the diocese declares that the use of automobiles is inconsistent with the humility which should adorn the clergy, and furthermore automobiling has been the frequent cause of the financial embarrassment of priests.

**St John River At
 Freshet Height**

The St. John river has swelled to freshet height again, the water here being 13 feet 8 inches higher than the low water mark and six feet higher than the lowest point reached since the first freshet of the present season.
 Since Saturday the water has come up two feet here while Van Buren reports that the water has come up eight feet in two days having risen at the rate of two inches per hour for the past forty-eight hours up to this morning. The water is still rising there, but at the rate of an inch an hour.
 The high water has caused a heavy run of logs into the booms, new logs running in large quantities yesterday and again today. With indications pointing strongly to heavy, warm rains the lumbermen are much pleased with conditions for getting out the lumber on the headwaters of the St. John river.
 From the Miramichi reports come that good progress is being made in bringing out the drives. O'Brien's drive on Porter Brook is expected to be in the main river today or tomorrow and the drives on Trout Brook and Salmon Brook will probably get into the main river the latter part of the week. The Taxis river drives are not yet out of the branches.—Gleaner

The many friends of Charles Emery were shocked to hear of his sudden death at Monticello, Maine, on Thursday, April 10th.

Mr. Emery has been visiting his relatives in this vicinity for some months and was feeling much better in health. He was on his way home and was waiting at Monticello to accompany his sister Mrs. Bull to Boston, when he was stricken with paralysis and died the day he was expected at his home in Haverhill. His wife and daughter reached his bedside a few hours before he died, but he was unconscious all the time.

A Record Day At The Clyde.

GLASGOW, Scotland, April 25.—Over 4,200 emigrants, a record of departures, in one day from the Clyde, sailed to-day for Canada and the United States. The Grampian carried 1,700, the Saturnia 1,250, and the California 1,280.
