

TENDERS ACCEPTED.

J. Fred Ryan of Fredericton has been awarded the contract for the new Agri-cultural School and the Fisher Memorial Library to be erected in Woodstock by the executors of the estate of the late L. P. Fisher. The cost of the two buildings will be approximately \$70,000, the school costing about \$40,000 and the the library \$30,000. They will be of stone, brick and concrete structures finished in the most modern way and with up to date appointments. Building operations will be commenced as soon as possible. The school beilding is to be ready for occupancy this fall, but neither building will be completely finished untill next spring. Mr. Ryan has erected some of the finest buildings constructed in Northern Maine dnring the past few years, and is being congratulated upon his success in landing this contract in the face of strong competition.
