LONDON, April 22.—An arson squad of militant suffragettes succeeded during the night in burning down the Hansworth Park boat-house in a Birmingham suburb. Four pleasure boats and a large quantity of equipment were destroyed.

With the opening of the boating season, attempts to destroy skiffs and shells are expected, and along most of the rivers and lake a close watch is kept by special patrols night and day for suffragettes bent on destruction.

FOX FARMING

Prices Paid for Breeding Purposes
Exceeds Pelt Values

A return of three hundred per cent. on the capital involved is what silver-farmers in the Maritime Provinces received, according to a report on fur-farming in Canada. The fur value of a silver fox varies from about \$300 to about \$2,500 according to the quality of the pelt, but the prices paid for foxes for breeding purposes far exceed this. Ultimately the value of the silver fox must be determined by its fur value and not by the prices now being paid for breeders. It is plain, also, that, in the course of a few years, the numerous ranches in process of formation and which are creating such a demand for breeding stock, will be producing pelts for the market. The principal points at which the industry is carried on are around Alberton, Summerside, Charlottetown and Montague in Prince Edward Island; Quebec city in Quebec; Port Elgin in New Brunswick, and Wyoming in Ontario.

OPENINGS FOR WOMEN

English Woman Who Spent Six Months in Canada Gives Address

Ella Sykes addressed the Royal Society of Arts concerning openings for educated women in Canada. Miss Sykes was so anxious to find out what openings existed that she spent six months in Canada as a working woman, took five temporary positions as home help in four Provinces, and received hospitality at chicken ranches and prairie farms. At the outset she met a rebuff at Winnipeg, where she was told "what a city English women are so seldom trained to do anything properly." Miss Sykes said this was humiliating, but true. She was surprised to find how low accordingly was her market value. When she thought of being home help she found the reality very different from what she had imagined it. seemed endless. Her experiences in several situations convinced her that the post of home help is unsuitable for educated English women, except perhaps on the Pacific slopes. Miss Sykes recommended educated English emigrants to consider becoming probationers in large western hospitals, elementary school teachers, stenographers or dressmakers. Poultry farming was lucrative if women could do the work themselves. "We are accused of wishing to drain the United Kingdom of all its capable women," concluded Miss Sykes. "We replied that with one and a half million more women than men, a few hundred can well be spared. If England is so anxious to keep her daughters let her give them better salaries."

Many Drives are Likely to Hang Up

Fredericton, April 22.—The expected trouble in getting out the drives in the central portion of the province is developing and it now looks as if many of the drives in this part of the country would be tied up. R. B. Smith of Oromocto cut about eight million feet of logs on the Oromocto and on Little River, Sunbury county, and it is said today that all the lumber he has been successful in bringing out will not amount to more than one million feet. The drive on the Oromocto has been hung up, one drive on the Little River is also hung up while an effort is being made to drag out the other drive on Little River. The water in the St. John river here has come up steadily during the past couple of days, but is not rising rapidly to-day.

Set Fire To Historic

English Church

LONDON, April 22.—Another "arson squad" made an unsuccessful attempt to set fire to the historic parish church at Minster-In-Thanet, which is one of the oldest in the United Kingdom and contains many pre-reformation relics.
