A HEDGE FOR THE GARDEN.

For a dividing line between the
house grounds and other parts of
the premises, a low growing hedge
that is beautiful all the year round
is the barberry. In summer it has
beautiful green foliage, changing
in autumn to brilliant tints, and in
the winter the wood is a bright col-
or, and covered with red berries.
It is hardy unless in very cold cli-
mates.

Some kind of plant growth
should be near the base-walls of the
house in order to do away with the
naked look a bare foundation gives.
Nothing that will reach above the
window-sill and obstruct the light
should, however, be used. Many
of the spires will fill in the corners
and angles admirably, and the list
of plants suitable for such work is
not small. The annual phlox, the
petunia, low-growing pinks and
sweet-williams—in fact many of
the old garden flowers may be used
better than the new, as they most-
ly take care of themselves. If the
petunia is given rich ground it
makes too rank stalk-growth and
flowers less than if on poor soil.
Ever-blooming roses do well where
there is plenty of sunshine, and
for them the ground can not be
made too rich. Keep them cut
back well to encourage new growth
as the flowers are on the new
branches.

FOR A SPRAIN

For a bad sprain, bandage the
affected part then pour over it, hot
water mixed with two parts of vin-
egar, as hot as the patient can stand.

CHINA CEMENT,

A cement which, when dry, is
perfectly white, is made of a thick
solution of gum arabic, in which a
stirred plaster of paris until it is of
the consistency to hold the pieces
of china together. Coat the edges
with the mixture, press the pieces
together tightly, and remove all
surplus plaster from the outside,
tie or fasten the pieces together
and leave undisturbed for a week
or more to get thoroughly dried.
It is claimed that when perfectly
dry, it will not come apart.

Sponges are great germ collec-
tors and should be scalded frequen-
tly.

Milk is very good to take out
ink spots when they are fresh. It
has no effect on dry ink spots.

When velvet is spotted with
rain, allow it to dry thoroughly,
then brush well with a stiff brush.

Rub porcelain and enameled sur-
faces with a cloth saturated with
kerosene oil to remove stains.

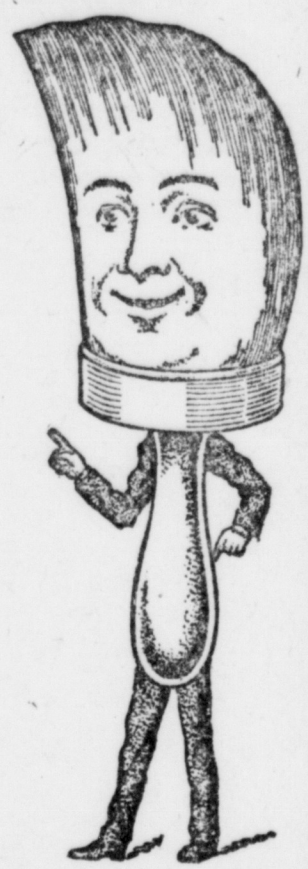

The Cold Pack.

A cold pack is a fine home substitute
for a Turkish bath when such treat-
ment is indicated. It is an ideal way
to get up a good, healthy reaction
when the circulation is sluggish.

Wrap the patient, naked, in a sheet
wrung out of cold water, then wrap
patient and sheet in several blankets
or in a blanket and a quilt. Swathe
