## Two Burned to death in Newspaper Fire.

Chatham, Ont., May 10.—The Chatham Herald office was destroyed by fire early this morning. Alex McDougall, foreman of the composing room, and Robert Birch, a linotype, have not been seen since and there is little doubt that they were burned to death. Charles Hicklin and H. Premo, pressmen, and Arthur Cartier, linotype operator, had narrow escapes. The loss is \$75,000 insurance \$50,000.

Hay, to conduct the civil service examinations, which are to be held in the Centennial school exhibition from Tuesday to Friday of next week. About thirty-five candidates, including seven ladies, will write the examinations.

## GOVERNMENT INSPECTION OF MOVING PICTURES.

ROME, May 10.—The government on Friday introduced a bill in parliament providing for government supervision of moving picture shows and a tax on foreign and domestic films.

## German View Of Panama Tolls.

Berlin, May 9.—The exemption of American vessels from the payment of tolls for passing through the Panama Canal is unjust and places German shipping at a disadvantage, according to Philip Heineken the managing director of the North German Lloyd, writing in the Tageblatt.

The writer expresses confidence, however, that German shipping interests are sufficiently powerful and enterprising to maintain competition even under these circumstances.

Herr Heineken hopes that under the regime of President Wilson the measure of discrimination will be revoked. He foresees a big immigrant traffic to the Pacific coast of both Canada and the United States and in a more limited way also to the States of South America, thus bringing to an end the inundation of the northeastern states.

## Marconi Resents Lilliman's Proposal.

LONDON, May 7.—William Marconi called as a witness to-day by the Marconi inquiry committee of Parliament, made a two hours statement, wherein he gave the history of invention of wireless, and declared that his experiments had cost him \$1,800,000.

Referring to the financial scandals, Mr. Marconi said:

"I resent the inquiry into and the publication given to affairs of my company which have no relation whatsoever to the contract entered into with His Majesty's government. Particularly do I refer to the business carried out by Godfrey Isaacs and myself in America, as related by Mr. Isaacs in his evidence, which I fully endorse and confirm."

"I regret the services my company has for many years rendered to the nation should not be deemed worthy of higher consideration."

The inventor's protest was applauded.

## TO STOP SHIPS SPEEDING UP MISSISSIPPI.

NEW ORLEANS, La., May 10.—Methods to stop vessels from coming up the Mississippi river at full speed during high water were discussed at a joint meeting of levee boards here to-day. The wash from ships, especially the larger ocean liners, is a serious menace to the levees during flood stage and severe measures probably will be authorized in order to hold the boats to a maximum speed of eight miles an hour. Even United States warships were accused of plying the river under full headway. It was pointed out that the danger has been increased greatly with the opening of Southwest Pass, which permits the entrance of the largest vessels into the river.

## Ineligible Aliens Admitted To Canada

SEATTLE, Wash., May 9.—A private gateway to the United States through the Canadian boundary which has been admitting ineligible aliens by the wholesale, has been discovered, and the gatekeeper and twenty-one Russian immigrants are under arrest.

The Russians were taken into custody at Custer, Washington. They told of having crossed the American border by a trail near Blaine, led by a guide who charged them only a dollar each as pilot fee. The immigrants were ticketed from Russia to Vancouver, and thus were able to land at New York and make a continuous journey from the United States to the Canadian border nearest their destination. The heavy stream of immigrants into Vancouver from Russia led to an official investigation.

## General Agreement Between Commissioners.

LONDON, May 10.—Hon. Sydney Tudor, the Australian minister of trade and customs, and the Hon. Geo. E. Foster, Canadian minister of trade and commerce, have arrived at a general agreement regarding reciprocity between the Commonwealth and the Dominion. The schedules will be discussed after Mr. Foster's visit to Tasmania. Both ministers express their keen gratification with regard to the agreements.
