Mr Malcolm Ross

The flag has been flying at half mast over city hall since Saturday afternoon as a mark of respect to the late Malcolm Ross, who after thirty years faithful service as a city employee, has passed away.

Mr. Ross has been chief engineer at the municipal water pumping plant and in all his long tenure of office his record was not marred by a single black mark and he had given faithful and conscientious service to the city. As a further mark of respect to his memory the city council and city officials are attending the funeral this afternoon in a body.

He was born in Manguerville, Sunbury County, and was in his 78th year. He moved to this city with his father, the late James Ross, and family, when a small boy and became marine engineer. He entered the employ of the city as engineer in the water department, when the water works was installed about 30 years ago, and remained in active service in the city's employ until laid up by his fatal illness.

Besides his widow, who was formerly Miss Charlotte Hooper, sister of Mayor W. S. Hooper, he is survived by three sons, Story D., of Portland, Me. Robert and Charles, at home, and four daughters, Mrs. Anderson, wife of Major Anderson, of St. John, Mrs. Kerr, wife of Rev. J. R. Kerr, of Philadelphia, Pa., Mrs. Harry O'Key, of Lynn, Mass., and Mrs. J. A. McKenzie, of Vancouver, B. C. One brother, Robert Ross, of Woodstock, N. B., and three sisters Mrs. Cowan, Mrs. Harding and Miss Georgie Ross, of St. John, survive.

Rev. Dr. W. H. Smith conducted the funeral services this afternoon and interment was made at the Rural cemetery.

Died At St. Agathe

Word has been received here of the death at St. Agathe, near Montreal, on Sunday, of Mr. Francis Richards, aged 19 years, after an illness of tuberculosis.

He had made his home with Mrs. Ewinsford Balloch, who will accompany the remains here tomorrow. The funeral will take place on Wednesday afternoon, at 2 o'clock from the residence of Mrs. Balloch, corner of Waterloo Row and Shore street, and interment will be made at Spring Hill.
