Explosion Wrecked Town In Scotland.

GLASGOW, March 10--A terrible dynamite explosion killed many inhabitants of the town of Irvine, in Ayrshire and injured hundreds of others to-day, as well as virtually wrecking the town itself.

The explosion occurred at Nobel's explosives works at Ardor, a little over twenty miles from Glasgow.

The town of Irvine was shaken to its foundations. Many houses, churches, schools and public institutions were irretrievably damaged.

Ceilings fell everywhere, partitions collapsed and scarcely a window was left intact.

People walking on the streets were thrown to the ground and all the inhabitants rushing from their houses in consternation.

The harbor and many works adjacent to the scene of the explosion were masses of wreckage.

There were three distinct explosions, followed by an immense column of smoke which rose high into the air and could be seen miles away.

Six bodies had been recovered up to four o'clock this afternoon while seven people seriously injured and a large number of others with slighter hurts have been taken to hospitals.

VERVINS, France, March 10--Ten people were fatally injured and forty-six others seriously hurt in a panic caused by the explosion of a moving picture apparatus in a small upstairs theatre here last night. The audience numbered one hundred and twenty, most of whom were children.

CASHLESS MILLIONAIRES

Frequently a Lamentable Lack of Quick Assets.

Though Canada's basic position is undoubtedly sound, there is a lamentable lack of quick assets on the personal ledgers of most business men. Canada has hundreds, one might say thousands, of millionaires, and thousands of near-millionaires, but their wealth is, for the main part "on paper" and the average, common or garden individual whose entire assets amount to not more than a few hundred dollars will be surprised to know that the millionaire or near-millionaire hasn't enough "hard cash" to meet his own personal obligations. This is no exaggeration. Of course these wealthy men are fairly "liquid" during a boom season when it is easy to realize on land, property or stocks, but the boom wane momentarily and the men credited with hundreds of thousands of dollars of personal fortune, are tied up as tightly as any lunatic in a straight jacket.

There has been so much speculative activity in all commodities and such a bright prospect for its continuance that everybody's account is extended to the utmost. It should require no argument to show that this is radically wrong and dangerous. There is not enough liquid resource in the great personal fortunes of Canadians, and it is bad for the whole country. It is clear enough that when everybody is "tied up" there can be no automatic support in time of liquidation. If the near-millionaire kept from 45 to 50 per cent. of their resources in hard cash, they would have ample funds to "play with" and at the same time have a reserve capital which would not only be an asset to themselves but to the whole country. Neither would they lose by this policy, as they would be in a position to take advantage of the "bargain counter" when the man "loaded up" had to sacrifice some of his extended and top-heavy commitments.--The Financial Times.

SURPRISED THE EMPEROR

Pilot Refused to Obey Orders of the Kaiser and Was Decorated.

A member of the German Yacht Club has related the following anecdote about the German Emperor:

When the Kaiser's yacht, the Hohenzollern, was entering a Norwegian port, the Kaiser, impatient at the vessel's slow progress, rang the engine room telegraph bell and ordered increased speed. To his great stupefaction, the pilot, an old Norwegian named Nordhuns, jumped to the telephone and called to the engineers to take no notice of the signal, but to slow down again. The Emperor, after a glance at the man who dared to speak thus in his presence, ordered the pilot to go and put himself under arrest, but the old man, without moving an eyebrow, replied: "I shall not leave this spot. The ship is under my direction, and nobody, not even an Emperor, is going to give me any orders."

The officers present, knowing that the pilot had maritime law on his side, looked on in silence, and were surprised to see the Emperor quit the bridge and leave the old pilot in charge of the ship's navigation.

On the following day the Kaiser's mood has passed, and he decorated the old sailor, at the same time appointing him his official pilot in Norwegian waters.

FOR CLEAN SPORT

Former Cambridge Blue Points to the End of Gambling.

Rev. Canon Stuart, of Cambridge, England, speaking in Winnipeg, made a strong plea to the young man of today to lead a clean life in mind and body. He spoke strongly against gambling, which he said did incalculable harm. He pointed out that not only did it hurt a business man but it spoiled sport and kept it from being clean and wholesome. Canon Stuart said that he felt he had some right to speak of sport since he had captained the Harrow eleven and had rowed for Cambridge. Gambling and betting spoil the character. A merchant in following legitimate speculation is building up his character. The man who indulges in betting finds that by a stroke of good fortune he can make more than by a long grind at honest work and so he takes a dislike to work. This is not building up character. The speaker pointed out that those present who were employers would never trust a man who gambled. Such a man preferred to shirk honest labor and try and make his money by the lucky stroke. Gambling produced a hardness in character and a selfishness in nature, and the gambler does not give his neighbor a "quid pro quo." He is getting something for nothing; something for which he has not worked. As an illustration he told how he had rowed at Cambridge and upon one occasion rowing in his boat as stroke, he also by a neat arrangement would steer the boat with his foot my pressing on a device attached by catgut to the rudder.
