**TO PRESERVE ELKS.**  
 It is estimated that there are  
 not over 70,000 elk in the United  
 States at the present time, and  
 most of these are in Yellowstone  
 National Park and Jackson Hole  
 Reserve in Wyoming, where they  
 are under careful protection.

**FORCEMEAT BALLS.**  
 Take half a pound of veal and  
 half a pound of suet chopped very  
 fine, and beat in a marble mortar  
 or wooden bowl into a paste; add  
 a few sweet herbs shredded finely,  
 a little ground mace, a small nut-  
 meg, grated, a slip of lemon peel,  
 a pinch of pepper and salt, and the  
 beaten yolks of two eggs; mix them  
 all well together and make them  
 into balls and long pieces, then  
 roll in flour and fry brown. If to  
 be used with white sauce, do not  
 fry them but put in a saucepan of  
 hot water and let boil a few min-  
 utes.

**ONION SAUCE.**  
 Put into a clean saucepan a  
 tablespoonful of fat (trippings will  
 do). When this is melted, shred  
 two or three onions, according to  
 their size, fine, and allow them to  
 fry, but not brown; then stir a  
 tablespoonful of sifted flour into  
 the pan and allow to simmer, but  
 keep stirring; add a cupful of soup  
 stock, if you have it; if not, water  
 with the necessary seasoning, a  
 tablespoonful of vinegar and a very  
 small pinch of sugar. Cut up any  
 scraps of cold meat you may have,  
 rather fine, and put into the sauce;  
 allow to heat for five minutes, but  
 do not boil; serve very hot.

**APPLE BUTTER.**  
 Put nine pounds of brown sug-  
 ar and a little more than two gal-  
 lons of water into a kettle, and let  
 it boil; then add three pecks of  
 tart cooking apples. After they  
 begin to cook, stir constantly un-  
 til the butter is done. Try it by  
 putting a little in a saucer, and if  
 no water appears around it the  
 marmalade is ready for the cinna-  
 mon and nutmeg to your taste.

**A CHEAP AND NUTRITIOUS DISH.**  
 Chop half a pound of cheese as finely  
 as possible. Simmer one breakfast  
 cup of rice in one quart of milk, and  
 when tender add the cheese. Mix well  
 and bake half an hour.

**FILLING FOR FLOOR CRACKS**  
 Here are directions for filling  
 cracks in floor, or open joints in  
 work, which may be used be-

fore painting or oiling. Tear sev-  
 eral soft newspapers into shreds  
 quite fine, and soak them in water  
 until saturated, then squeeze out.  
 Mix a pint of flour and one quart  
 of water until no lumps, beating  
 quite smooth; then stir in a table-  
 spoonful of powdered alum and beat  
 into the mixture two quarts of  
 boiling water. Set it on the stove  
 where the paste will keep hot, and  
 mix into it the moistened paper  
 until the mixture is quite thick  
 --- as thick as soft putty. Then,  
 with a putty knife, press the  
 paste into all the cracks, smoothing  
 down as you go along, being care-  
 ful to get the cracks full and the  
 mixture well pressed in. When  
 this hardens, it can be colored  
 like the wood, and will last in-  
 definitely.

**The Rhodes Trust.**

(Boston Advertiser.)

There is something very mag-  
 nificent and impressive in the pro-  
 cess which the last will and testa-  
 ment of Cecil Rhodes set in mo-  
 tion. He designed that the world  
 in which he believed, England and  
 her colonies, the United States and  
 Germany, should be bound together  
 by picked men of each generation.  
 For this purpose, he made the Ox-  
 ford bequest and since the founda-  
 tion was established the Rhodes  
 scholarships have been drawing  
 students from Australia, Canada,  
 Germany, the State of the Amer-  
 ican union and New Zealand.

During the academic year 1911  
 —12, there were 180 of the schol-  
 ars in residence at Oxford. Thirty  
 one completed their terms and 28  
 newly-elected scholars came into  
 residence. The scholars were dis-  
 tributed among the colleges, each  
 one of twenty colleges having one  
 or more of them. The subjects  
 which they pursued are distributed  
 over the whole range of the curri-  
 culum, but the largest single group  
 is found in jurisprudence, as is  
 most natural. A number of the  
 Rhodes men have gained scholastic  
 distinction at Oxford, but they  
 have not yet threatened to monop-  
 olize the prizes.

Apparently the Rhodes men are  
 winning more than their share of  
 athletic honors. They can be found  
 on almost every team in which  
 competition was had with Cam-  
 bridge. Six of them were mem-  
 bers of the Rugby football team.  
 It may seem strange to dwell upon  
 this in speaking of the world's  
 greatest scholarship, but the direc-  
 tors of the Rhodes foundation  
 have laid no small emphasis upon  
 it. However, a great many of the  
 scholars have published during the  
 year. This has been true of more  
 than 20 of them, and the range  
 has included the most abstruse sub-  
 jects, as well as an edition of the  
 works of the late O. Henry. The  
 titles of most of the publications

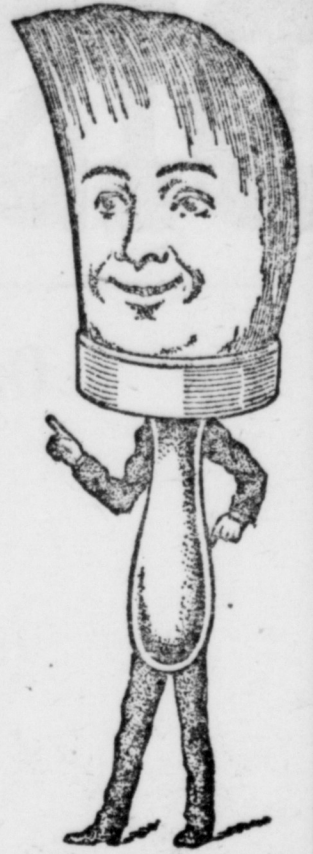

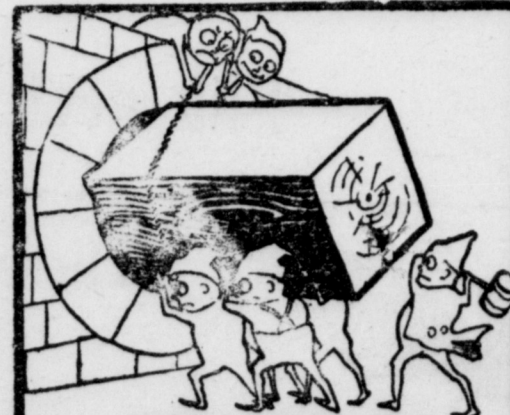
