E. Pauline Johnson Died On Friday.

E. Pauline Johnson, the Indian poetess, died at Vancouver on Friday after a year's illness.

E. Pauline Johnson (Tekahionwake) was the daughter of George H. M. Johnson, the head chief of the Six Nation Indians. Her mother was Emily Howells, a native of Bristol, England. She was born on the Reserve in Brant county, Ont. She was educated privately and early in life showed an interest in poetry and began to write verses that were published in various American and Canadian monthlies. Many of her best poems, those with the greatest fire and spirit, deal with Indian topics. She was a warm champion of the Indian, a lover of the out of doors and a passionate imperialist. Her various writings, both poetry and prose, reflect this. In 1894 Miss Johnson visited England and published under the title White Wampun a collection of poems that created a most favorable impression. She returned to England again in 1906 as a poet entertainer, and was widely entertained by nobility and other distinguished people. A few years ago Miss Johnson published a second volume of poems, Canadian Born, and only recently under the title Flint and Feathers there was issued a complete collection of her poetical writings. A voluminous prose of Indian legends and stories also has attracted great attention. Miss Johnson contributed many stories to magazines and was one of the most prolific of Canadian authors. She had visited widely in Canada and the United States, reciting her poems and was one of the most popular entertainers in the country. For the past year she has been ill in Vancouver. Friends all over the Dominion have heard of her death with regret.

The sudden death of Mrs. Burton Hawkins (Miss Pearl Flanders) which occurred at the home of her brother-in-law's Centreville, was received with great sadness by her friends and relatives at Maple View, Victoria County, where she was born and lived until the time of her death. A few days before her death she removed with her husband to Centreville where she might get medical treatment, but medical aid proved of no avail, and she passed peacefully away, March the 4th, in the 24th year of her age. Mrs. Hawkins was a bright, cheerful young woman and made friends for herself wherever she went. She will be greatly missed by all who knew her. She leaves to mourn her loss a sorrowing father, Mr. William Flanders in the eightysixth year of his age, one brother, a husband and an infant daughter, besides a large concourse of friends and relatives.
