TOWN COUNCIL.

Council met on Monday, Dec. 1st, at 8 p. m.

In the absence of the Mayor, Coun. J. T. A. Dibblee presided.

Coun. Balmain read the reports of the treasurer for the last month and for eleven months; there is at present an overdraft at the bank of \$3,839.48. Referred to audit committee. A short discussion took place on the town's financial condition. A letter from B. G. Walker, Secy-Treas., of the hospital was read, in which the grant to the institution of \$500 was requested to be paid forthwith. An order was passed to pay the amount.

Coun. Lindsay asked why action was not taken on the Gould application to erect poles and stretch wires in the town. It was a matter the councillor thought should receive attention.

Town Clerk Hartley said the matter had been referred to him as to the position of the town legally. He would say that the council had the right to grant the company permission to erect poles and stretch wires through the town.

Coun. Gallagher thought it would be better to wait and see what action the County Council took on the matter. The company would have to have permission to get into the county and it would be better to wait until this permission was granted.

Coun. Balmain was not disposed to throw cold water on the scheme, but, like Coun. Gallagher, he could not see where any interest would be benefited by action at the present time. He would move that the matter lay over until the County Council took action. Carried.

Coun. Lindsay thought the revisors were poorly paid and he would move that they be paid \$25.00 each for their services. Carried.

Coun. Balmain said there seemed to be some difference of opinion respecting the bye-law in relations to repairs on buildings within the fire limit. Nearly everyone complied with the law but there were some exceptions. Several buildings had recently been shingled, which was contrary to the law, and if this was going to continue it was time something should be done about it.

Several members of the board expressed their views on the question and the matter dropped.

The bill of the C. P. R. for 1-3 p. c. of cost of gateman at King street crossing was ordered to be paid.

The regular meeting of the Town Council on Friday night was attended by Mayor Jones and Couns Lindsay, Burden and Gallagher.

Moved by Couns. Lindsay and Gallagher and passed that the bills coming from the audit be approved and orders drawn on treasurer for amount.

Voted that the salaries falling due be ordered paid.

The street committee was given power to give permission to Mr. Jules to clean up the extension to Cedar street, to cut down the bushes and shrubs, and otherwise improve the street, but at no cost to the town.

Council then adjourned.

YOUNG'S COVE ROAD

Dec. 4th 1913.

Our Autumn here, has been one of the mildest in many years, and cattle could get their living until Dec. 1st.

We have about 3 1-2 inches of snow, and with our good roads makes fair sleighing.

Since the change of time on what was the N. B., Coal and R. R. Co., Road, which is now a part of the C. P. R. and is opened to Fredericton for traffic, our mails here are a day behind. Formerly we got the St. John daily papers, the same day they were printed, now the day after, making us a little behind with our news.

Our game season has closed, and but little of the big game was captured in this part of the country. We feed the game to a great extent during the summer, but when the season opens, we have to pay the sum of \$3. to hunt them, whether we get any or not. I claim the farmers should have the right to shoot moose and deer for their own use with out paying for a license.

Our local meat vender William Kelly has purchased a building from William Gale and had it removed to his place of business and fitted it up in modern style for a slaughter house.
