Mexican Rebels Claim To Have Won.

Juarez, Mexico, Dec. 4.—While looting by isolated bands, or confiscation of property by rebels, may continue, the days of fighting in Northern Mexico are numbered, so far as the present revolution is concerned, according to opinions expressed by rebel leaders to-day.

General Francisco Villa's assertion that there was not much more to fight for in the north, because of the bankruptcy of the federal army, which caused it to evacuate so important a city as Chihuahua has spread among the rebels.

What most immediately concerns the so-called constitutionalists party now is the elaboration of its civil government. This embraces a more systematized customs to be enforced along the border. The rebels hold all the important border towns except Nuevo, Laredo, and Piedras Negras, opposite Eagle Pass. There remains also to be put in force a uniform currency system, for now rebel and federal currency are in conflict, one kind being acceptable in one place, and another kind in another. The rebel postage stamps already are in use. Many governors and State officials are to be selected.

Within a short time, the leaders say, a government will be in operation in the northern half of the country, which will be entirely independent of that at Mexico City.

The settlement of the civil questions is one reason why Villa has asked General Carranza to meet him at Chihuahua, Sylvester Terzis, a newspaper editor in Chihuahua, who is not related to the wealthy Terzis family, has been selected for governor of the State.

Villa expects to leave to Carranza the task of establishing civil government, devoting himself to the military campaign, southward towards Mexico City.

CHEESE FROM PASTEURIZED MILK.

The University of Wisconsin is famed for its research work in the interest of the community at large. A recent report extols the advantages of making cheese from pasteurized milk. The sanitary gain is evident, Experiments of two years in the Dairy School of the University's College of Agriculture indicate an increased yield and better quality also. The experiments systematically divided each day's milk into two portions to be used in a factory; one part was pasteurized and made into cheese by a representative of the College of Agriculture, while the remainder was handled by the local cheesemaker in the usual manner. The results of these tests were so satisfactory that it was decided to continue the work at other factories in 1913. Accordingly the new process was put on trial during the present season at factories located near Spring Green, De Forest, Waldo, and Sheboygan Falls. The pasteurized milk cheese has sold regularly at the ruling market prices, and the increase in yield is five per cent.

FOOT AND MOUTH DISEASE IN SOUTH AMERICA.

A South American journal says that foot and mouth disease is prevalent in the Province of Buenos Ayres, in the Republic of Argentina, especially in the dairies near the federal capital. At the great Palermo stock show many of the cattle on exhibition were suffering from the disease and even the champion Hereford bull was so affected that when sold at auction, he brought only \$5,700, which is far below what he would have brought in that country under other circumstances. The new outbreak is of an especially virulent type and all hope of exporting live stock to Europe must be relinquished for the time being.

THIS GIRL DID EVERYTHING BACKWARDS.

LONDON, Dec. 6 A puzzling problem of abnormality in a girl, who insisted on doing everything backwards, among other things writing from right to left, has been solved by Birmingham physicians. An examination by the X-rays has revealed the fact that her heart is on the right side, and some of her other organs, including the brain, are also displaced. The case renewed interest in that of the boy who saw things upside down and wrote in that fashion. The latter came to light about two weeks ago.

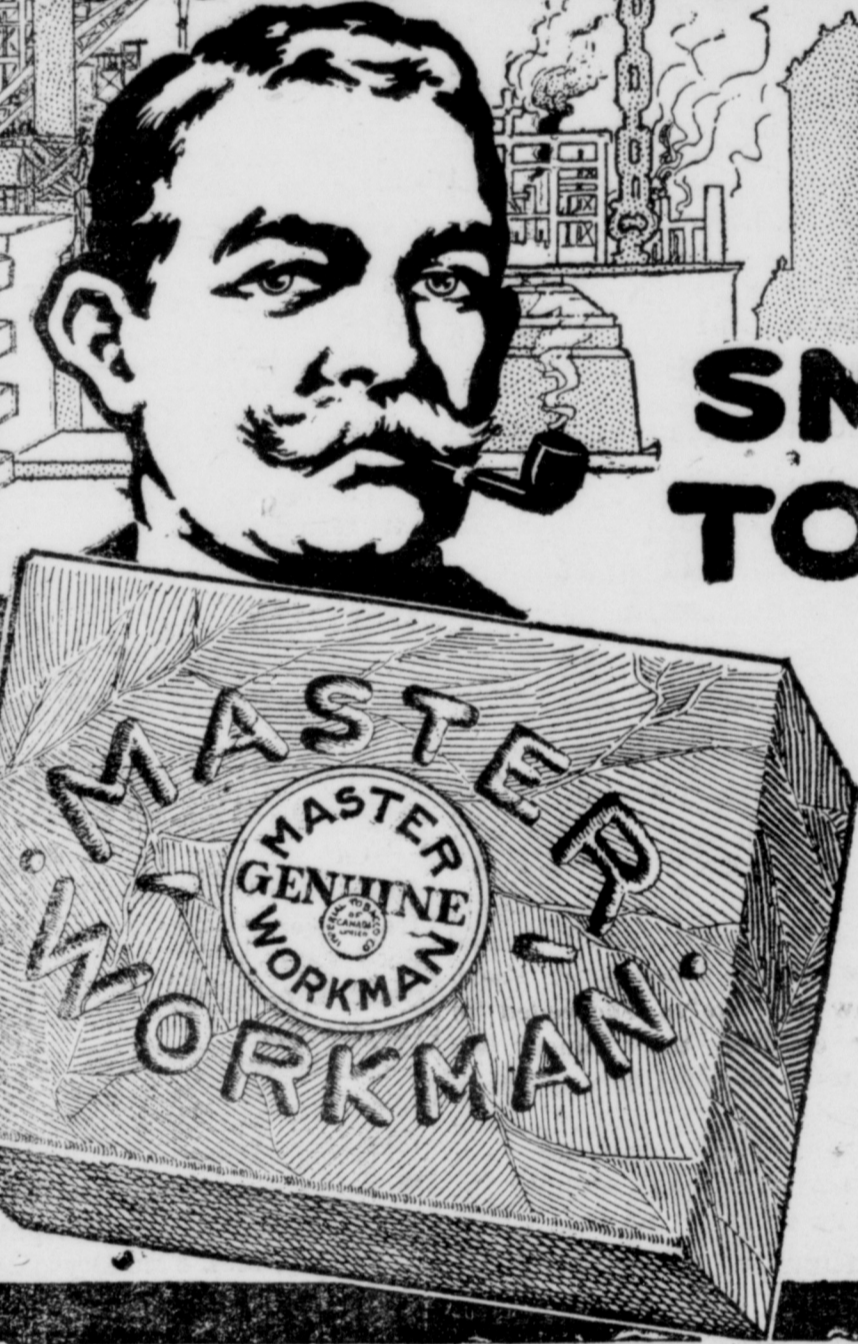

Carve New Joint At Elbow Of Boy Fight Against the Browd Tall

LOS ANGELES, Cal., Nov. 30.—One of the most remarkable operations in the annals of surgery, has just given a new elbow to Frankin Whitty, a 12-year-old inmate of the Children's hospital.

Six years ago the lad suffered a contusion at the right elbow, and soon after the ulna or water bone of the lower arm began to grow together with the humerus or bone of the upper arm.

Dr. Lewis B. Morton made incisions in the arm close to the elbow and carved a new elbow joint. It was practically the fashioning of a new ball and socket where the boy's natural elbow joint should have been. The matter of lubrication was one of extreme delicacy. Substances were brought from the upper arm and made to form around the man-made elbow.

Moth

Fredericton, Dec. 5.—Charlotte county has always been a most important field for operations of the brown-tail moth as they have been more prevalent there than elsewhere. The first report has been received from exterminating parties who had been sent into Charlotte county to start this work. The report shows that 1,000 nests had been found in the first week's work which had been carried on, this number being as large as for the biggest entire season heretofore. Last year only about 200 nests were found during the whole season's work in the entire province, while the total for the previous season was about as large as for the first week of this year.

It is believed by experts that the brown-tails in Charlotte county have been carried there from across the border by winds and upon trains and steamers. The Provincial Agricultural Department is grappling with the problem in an energetic manner. Secretary Daggett announced to-day that the department would at once double their staff of men in the field, and that the federal department would be asked to do likewise, and would undoubtedly consent. 'We will do everything in our power to control this pest,' said Mr. Daggett.

NO HINDU PROBLEM FOR CANADA

A British Columbia judge has declared illegal all the restraints imposed on the migration of Hindus from India to Canada. If this judgment is sustained by the higher tribunals before which it will doubtless be carried in due course, there will be no legal impediment in the way of sending whole shiploads of these

dark-skinned people of the Far East on the shores of British Columbia, at Halifax or at Montreal.

Thus the Hindu problem which, as may be seen by our Scissored and Penned department, is creating bitter hostility between India and South Africa, will be brought directly before the people of this Dominion. That the people of Canada any more than those of South Africa, will submit to unrestricted migration from India is not to be thought of for a moment. With the example of the negro problem in the United States before us daily we would be foolish indeed to permit the creation of a yellow or brown problem that would be equally difficult of solution here.
