Woodstock Rural Summer School

The Board of Education Friday morning completed arrangements for a rural summer school to be conducted at the Fisher Memorial Agricultural School at Woodstock during the summer of 1914.

The school will open the second week in the month of July and will continue for four weeks with six instructors in charge and ninety teachers taking the courses. Directors of Elementary Agricultural Education, R. P. Steeves, Director of Manual Training, J. F. Peacock and M. H. Hagerman of the Provincial Normal School, will be in charge of the school, acting under the direction of Chief Superintendent of Education, Carter and Hon. Dr. Landry, the Minister.
