Anticipating New Parcel Post

Ottawa, Nov. 17.—One difficulty which the Post Office Department is meeting with in preparing for the inauguration of a parcel post system is the lack of accommodation in many of the post office buildings. In many of the larger cities, where the business it is expected will be the heaviest, the buildings are inadequate and overcrowded now. Toronto, Ottawa and other large cities have facilities incapable of handling the present mail matter, without the rush of business which will likely follow with the establishment of a parcel post. Extra buildings will in many cases have to be rented, while there will have to be large additions to the staffs.

On Thursday of this week, Mr. Pelletier will meet with representatives of the various railways to consider many details of the new system. It is understood also that the railways are asking for much higher carrying rates.

TO RUSH WORK ON HUDSON BAY RY.

Ottawa, Nov. 17.—The Government in its endeavor to rush the work of the Hudson Bay Railway will likely start construction next spring from Port Nelson, so that work can be going on from both ends. If it is found feasible a strip with rails, supplies and men will be sent north early in the spring. Engineer McLachlan, who is in charge of the terminal work at Hudson Bay, will send to Ottawa overland a list of the necessary equipment for next season.

He Riled Gladstone.

Disraeli, it is said, laughed only once in the house of commons. Mr. Gladstone had made an impassioned speech in favor of the union of Wallachia and Moldavia. Mr. Disraeli, speaking in opposition, pointed out that the result would be the extinction of the independence of these people, and the only thing left would be the remorse "which would be painted with admirable eloquence by the rhetorician of the day." In reply Mr. Gladstone said that he would not be guilty of the affected modesty of pretending to be ignorant that that designation "the rhetorician of the day" was intended for himself. Mr. Disraeli interrupted with the re-

mark: "I beg your pardon. I really did not mean that." Disraeli sat down with a satisfied smile that told of his enjoyment.

Mr. Gladstone's face expressed amazement and indignation. His opponent had placed him in the mortifying position of applying a remark to himself which had no such personal reference, therefore Gladstone's wrath, and Disraeli's smile. The Liberal leader proceeded with his speech and condemned the "sesquipedalian words and inflated language" of the leader of the Conservatives.

C P R To Operate Southampton RY

Mr. James K. Pinder, M. L. A. who was in Fredericton on Saturday, announced that the Southampton Railway would be taken over within a few days for operation as a part of the Canadian Pacific Railway system.

Last week C. P. R. engineers and bridge experts made an examination of the line, and upon receipt of their report the formal taking over of the road is expected to follow at once. This week may see the commencement of C. P. R. operation of the line.

At the present time there are two trains each way daily over the line, connections being made with all four trains on the Gibson branch of the C. P. R. each day. When the new road is operated by the C. P. R. it is not known just what service will be given, but it is believed that there will be a connection for passengers to Fredericton and Woodstock each morning via the Gibson branch and returning over the Southampton line each evening on arrival at the junction point of the trains from Fredericton and Woodstock.

TRANS-ATLANTIC WIRELESS TELEPHONE

London, Nov. 18.—The trans-Atlantic wireless telephone is now an accomplished fact, according to a cable message to the London Daily Mail, from Sydney, Cape Breton, which says that Marconi had a thirty minute trans-Atlantic experiment between Clifden, Ireland, and Glace Bay, Nova Scotia. No details are given.

CANAL TONNAGE SHOWS INCREASE.

Ottawa, Nov. 17.—Canal statistics for the season of 1913 to Oct 31 show a big increase this year in business. The largest increase is at the Soo. Last year there went through the Soo 34,620,503 tons of freight, and this year 38,005,216 tons. The Welland Canal in 1912 handled 2,480,082 tons, and this year 3,209,559. The St. Lawrence also shows a big increase, from 3,032,271 tons to 3,863,840 tons. The total on all the Canadian canals was 46,428,783 tons, compared with 41,683,112 tons for the same period last year.

London, Nov. 15.—To-day the Independent labor party will open a month's campaign against the national service movement.
