HOUSEHOLD.

Grape Lemonade.
To one quart of lemonade, made
rather sweet, add a tumbler of pure
grape juice. Delicious.

Cookie Filling.
One cup cocked prunes, chopped
half cup prune syrup, one heaping
tablespoon currants, one teaspoon
flour. Cook until it thickens (use
brown sugar when cooking prunes)

Apple Batter.
Use sweet apples, or partly
sweet, place in a large kettle and
cover with just enough water to
flew; when soft, remove from ket-
tle and run through a colander to
extract the pulp; return to the ket-
tle and add a bottle of boiled cider
and sugar to taste. Boil, stirring
constantly, and when scum arises
to the top and it is about as thick
as marmalade, remove from the
stove and place in crock, keeping
in a cool, dry place. The top can
be covered with a layer of jam. Use
about one-half sugar.

Salad Filling For Sandwiches.
Mix one cupful of whipped
cream, a pinch of salt, a little lem-
on juice and one-half cupful of nut
meats. Spread between thin slices
of bread.

Another good salad filling can
be made of one-half cupful of chop-
ped celery leaves, a bit of pepper,
a slice of tomato and mayonnaise.
Mix celery leaves with the mayon-
naise and spread on the tomato,
placing between slices of bread.

IMPROVEMENT IN 40 YEARS.
D. plorable as the condition of
the poorer classes in England still
is, there has, nevertheless, been a
vast improvement in the life of
the present generation. In the
past forty years, the Westminster
Gazette says, pauperism has been
reduced by one half. When the
figures were first compiled in 1872,
the number of paupers was 42 per
thousand. On January 1 of this
year it was 21.7 per thousand.
Since 1910 the effect of Old-Age
Pensions in saving the aged from
pauper relief has been gradually
increasing. Pensions have not tak-
en many of the very old from the
workhouses, but they have pre-
vented many more from entering
them.

SWITZERLAND'S WATCH IN- DUSTRY.

Switzerland exported 11,529,316
watches last year with a total val-
ue of \$5,512,000. Of the watches
exported 7,112,803 were nickel,
3,346,637 silver and 1,069,876
gold. Of those exported 2,647,800
went to the United Kingdom, 1,-
696,000 to Germany, and 739,400
to India. Canada, was amongst the
the smaller purchasers, taking 50,-
000. The population of Switzer-
land, is only a little over 3 3-4
millions.

AVIATION AT THE POLE.

The well-known explorer Am-
undsen, who is now getting ready
for his new exploration to the
Pole, which he expects will last
from 1914 to 1919, has, says the
London Chronicle, stated that it
is his intention to take with him a
French aviator. He will himself
take a place in the aeroplane as a

A Necessary Food Supply

Some comparisons of records in-
dicate what infinitely better re-
turns some dairymen obtain from
their cows than do other owners of
herds. One lot of milk testing 3.4,
delivered at a factory last month
was 21,580 pounds, the yield of
20 cows in two herds. Two other
herds also totaling 20 cows and
producing 3.4 milk gave only 12,-
380 pounds during the same month.
These are not extreme comparisons
because in many cases the test was
lower and the total pounds of fat
delivered would be consequently
far lower. Apart however from the
weight of fat and the monetary
value of the milk, think of one
group of 20 cows giving in one
month four and a half tons of
milk more than the other group.

It needs no stretch of imagin-
ation to picture the consternation
there would be if Canadian cows
in general were as poor as these
twenty Ontario cows: people need
milk, plenty of it, as a good, nu-
tritious and cheap food in these
days of high prices. But if poor
cows with only low yields are kept,
where would be this necessary and
universally appreciated food sup-
ply.

Fortunately, through systematic
cow testing, these comparisons
are possible, so that an incentive
is furnished to every owner of a
poor herd to keep cows more wor-
thy the name of 'dairy cows. Sim-
ple records, easily kept, give de-
finite information on acting as guide
posts to herds bred and fed for
large yields.
