**Washing Blankets, Quilts, And
Comforters.**
(Mrs. W. C. Palmer.)

To wash blankets, quilts and
comforters, choose a warm sunny
day so that they will dry as
quickly as possible. Use soft
water if it can be obtained.

Blankets.—Woolen blankets
should be washed in luke warm
water, never in hot or cold water
as it shrinks them. Use a good
white soap or some reliable wool-
en soap. Put the blankets to
soak for fifteen minutes in warm
water, soaping the blanket as it
is put in the tub, putting on a
little extra soap where the blank-
ets is most soiled. After allow-
ing to soak, work the blanket
around in the tub, rubbing be-
tween the hands and applying
more soap where needed. Scuse
the blanket several times and
wring into another warm water,
going over blanket to see if any
soiled places have been missed.

Rinse a second time, wringing
the blanket as free from water
as possible. Shake well before
hanging up to dry. Roll each
corner a trifle and pin with a
small safety pin to prevent the
corners from whipping out.
When dry they will be fluffy and
soft, ready to fold away for an-
other winter. Another way is to
stretch the blankets on curtain
stretcher, putting them on double
Comforters.—Never rinse com-
forters in cold water as it tends
to harden the cotton batting.
Comforters are washed in the
same way as blankets only the
water should be fairly hot and
they should soak a couple of
hours in a good hot soapy water
to loosen up the dirt. The ends
or any parts may be rubbed on a
washboard or washed in the
washing machine. After the
comforters are dry, roll and beat
with a smooth round stick. This
will loosen up cotton and make
the comforters more fluffy.

Quilts.—Wash the same as
the comforters except that where
the colors will not run they
should be scalded to make them
more clear and fresh.

Hot Weather Drinks.

This is the season when every
one welcomes the long and cooling
draft and the sound of the tinkle of
ice against glass is a most alluring
one.

Many persons have unfortun-
ately conceived the idea that all iced
drinkables are harmful during the
warm weather. This is, however,
erroneous, as, if properly made and
slowly sipped, no injurious effect
need be apprehended.

While all fruit juices are wel-
comed by the thirsty soul, the acid
of lemon is particularly grateful
and cooling.

Plain Lemonade.

For a plain lemonade allow three
lemons to each quart of water and
about half a pound of sugar. This
however, is not a definite quantity
as much depends on the acidity of
the lemon and the variation in
tastes. Have the lemons perfectly
clean, cut two thin slices from the
center of each and lay aside. Chip
off some of the thin yellow rind
from several of the lemons and
squeeze out the juice, pressing
hard enough to extract some of

color and pleasing flavor, or a thin
slice of orange gives a good taste
as well.

Milk Lemonade.

A richer lemonade is made with
milk. Shave off the thin yellow
peel from a half dozen washed lem-
ons; cut in halves and squeeze out
the juice; mix the juice and peel;
add one cupful and a half of gran-
ulated sugar and allow the mix-
ture to stand an hour to blend; at
the end of that time press and rub
the sugar and peel with a wooden
spoon or muller; then add one-half
cupful of raspberry-juice and three
cupfuls of boiling milk, strain
through a cheese-cloth, and when
cold serve with the addition of
chipped ice or a little cold water.
