HOUSEHOLD.

Apple Butter.

Cook tart apples until soft, then
rub through a colander. To one
pint of the cooked apples add one
cup of sugar. Cook over a slow
fire in an uncovered kettle until
rich and thick, stirring constantly,
for like marmalade, it burns
easily. Just before removing from
the fire season with either cinna-
mon, cloves, nutmeg, or all spice,
to suit the taste.

Creamed Apple Tart

Line a small, deep pudding dish
with a plain pie paste, pack in one
and a half pints of apples, peeled
and sliced, with three quarters of
a cup of brown sugar, and grated
rind and juice of one-half lemon.
Cover and bake until well done.
Lift the crust and pour in one
pint of boiled custard. Re-cover
and set away to get ice cold. If
desired, whipped cream may be
substituted for the custard.

Cranberry and Apple Mound.

Cook equal parts of cranberry
and sliced apples together in a very
little water, then press them
through a sieve, and measure. Add
the juice of a lemon to each two
cupfuls, and allow one and one-
half cupfuls of sugar for each lem-
on. Stir over the fire for a few
minutes, until the sugar is dis-
solved, then simmer slowly for five
minutes. Take from the fire and
cool. Beat the whites of two eggs
to a stiff froth, and gradually
whisk one cupful of powdered sug-
ar into the mixture. Beat all to-
gether until stiff, turn into a wet
mold. Serve very cold.

Although bulbs will flower al-
most anywhere they have a pre-
ference for deep, sandy loam, with
plenty of cow-manure. It is well,
if the soil is at all heavy, to place
a handful of sand under each bulb.

When making a bulb bed, some
people dig out six inches of earth,
put on a layer of sand, set the
bulbs in position and throw the
earth around them, but it is not
necessary to take all this trouble.
A simpler plan is to spade the
ground deeply, working in a liberal
quantity of manure, and then to
put in the bulbs with a dibble.

In Place of Ferns.

A silver dish filled with grow-
ing ferns is charming, but there
are other humbler growing things
that are not without beauty. One
woman has tried several of them.

"You see," she explained to a
friend, "I found I could not raise
ferns successfully, they dried up,
wilted, and turned yellow. Then I
had this idea. I got several low,
wide pots that fit my silver fern-
dish, and filled them with rich
earth. In one I planted twenty
grains of corn. When it was three
inches high it was lovely, but now
it is six inches high, it is time to
bring on the next.

"See these feathery, waving
green things? They are carrot-plants.
Aren't they graceful?

"Next will come a pot of pep-
per-plants. The leaves are glossy,
and very pretty. I have also start-
ed some grapefruit-plants. They
will be the prettiest thing of all.
I shall try oranges and lemons too.
Don't get discouraged just because
you can't raise ferns."

Store seed corn where it will
dry out quickly. Do not leave it,
even overnight, in sacks, as it is
likely to heat and be injured.

It is a bad policy to wean young
pigs suddenly and put them on
cows' skimmed milk. The milk
should be fed them very gradually
at first, and several times a day.

With the other harvests over, it
is time to harvest the crop of farm
implements and tools scattered
about the place, and put them
out of the reach of the weather.

Do not be afraid to give the fall
pigs plenty of range during the
fall and winter time, providing
that they have a comfortable
feeding yard and a good, warm
sleeping place.

If fowls are started out right in
the fall they will go through the
severest winter without trouble.
Do not house your stock closely in
the fall. Get them accustomed to
the weather conditions as they
come.

The hen's great profit-producing
period is the first and second years,
and unless a hen is an exception-
ally good breeder she should be
disposed of at the end of her sec-
ond laying season and before
starting to moult.

If you have a good crop of corn,
the best ears, carefully selected both
as to the number of ears on the
stalk and the size and shape of
each ear will bring much more
next spring when sold by the
bushel.
