## Presbyterians in Council at Montreal

Montreal, Feb. 19.—Montreal is entertaining for three days a distinguished gathering of representatives of the Presbyterian and Reformed churches of the United States and Canada. The occasion is the biennial meeting of the American section of the Pan-Presbyterian Alliance. While the body has no authority over the churches, its deliberations and conclusions on questions of missionary, educational and social problems never fail to exert a strong influence in determining the policies of the Presbyterian denomination.

## New Collector Of Customs

Mr. George E. Balmain, who received the appointment of collector of customs at Woodstock in succession to the late Mr. Williamson Fisher, was sworn in by Inspector McLaren on Tuesday, and entered upon his duties the following day. The selection has given general satisfaction. He is a leader in the business life of the town and holds many important positions of trust. He will bring to his duties a trained mind and will prove a most efficient officer.

## Mormon Temple To be Built In Canada.

Funeral took place Saturday afternoon from the home of her late residence. The funeral sermon was preached by Pastor, C. S. Young, assisted by Pastor, F. C. Burnette of Arthuret U. B. church. The service was in the Presbyterian Church, of which Mrs. Nicholson had been a staunch member for years. By the large concourse of friends and relatives at the funeral, proved that she was held in high esteem and loved by all who knew her. "We sorrow not as those who have no hope."

## Suffragettes Wreck House of Lloyd-George

LONDON, Feb., 19.—An explosion, believed to have been caused by militant suffragettes, partially wrecked early this morning the country residence in course of erection for Chancellor of the Exchequer David Lloyd-George at Walton Heath, near London.

A bomb had been placed in one of the rooms of the residence which is a modest one, adjoining the golf links, on which Mr. Lloyd-George plays. The infernal machine was so powerful that neighbors who were attracted by the explosion found the thick walls of the house split in all directions and most of the rooms were wrecked.

Two seven pound tin cans of black powder also had been placed in two separate rooms among heaps of wood shavings which had been saturated with oil and in the centre of which burning candles had been fixed.

The only clues obtained by the police are two broken hatpins which were found among the wreckage.

It was declared by the neighbors that an automobile containing several people passed through a nearby village in the early hours.

Nobody was injured by the explosion, as the house had not yet been occupied.

An official of the Women's Social and Political Union declared that that society had no knowledge of the perpetrators, adding: "Plenty of people besides ourselves have a grudge against the Chancellor of the Exchequer."

"General" Mrs. Flora Drummond, however, evidently believed the explosion was the work of women. She exclaimed enthusiastically: "I think it is grand. It was a fine act, successfully carried out and shows the determination of the women. I say all power to all kinds of militancy in the direction of harrassing cabinet ministers, short of taking human life."

This is the second time within a year that violent methods have been used against the residences of cabinet ministers, the first being an attempt to burn the house of Lewis Harcourt, Secretary for the Colonies, at Nuneham.

## Willie Muckler

Another extremely sad accident took place at Plaster Rock, Monday, January 20th when Willie Muckler, lost his young life by the overturning of an engine on the C. P. R. Line, of which he was acting as fireman. The remains were taken to Perth, where a coroner's inquest was held, after which they were shipped back to Plaster Rock. The funeral was held on Wednesday at eleven o'clock in the U. B. Church, conducted by Rev.

## Girl Eats For The First

### Time In Thirteen Years

FORT WAYNE, Ind., Feb. 8.—For thirteen years Katherine Besse, of Milstadt, Ill., has been kept alive by pumping food into her stomach through her side, but now she is beginning, at the age of fifteen years, to eat food, and for the first time in that period to know how food tastes.

When she was two years old, at Milstadt, she drank lye and her throat was so badly burned that it adhered and closed the oesophagus.

The girl is now in St. Joseph's Hospital in this city. Dr. Maurice Rosenthal has supervised the treatment of her case.

At first, silk threads were given her to chew, and these threads gradually worked down through the trachea and in the course of a few weeks it was possible to reach the tissues of her stomach and treat them.

Then the girl was able to begin to eat, and the first things that were given her was candy.

## Jumped from Windows to Save their Lives

Herbert, Sask., Feb. 19.—Fire completely destroyed the Maple Leaf Hotel on Tuesday morning. It started about 3 o'clock and the proprietor, Wm. Bohm, with his wife and seven children, had to jump from a window in night apparel. Everybody in the hotel lost all their clothing and nothing whatever was saved.

## Madero is Prisoner in National Palace

General Victor Iano Huerta, who had been commanding the Madero forces against the rebellious troops under Felix Diaz, has been proclaimed provisional governor general of the republic.
