Madero Is Prisoner In National Palace

These arrangements have been agreed to by General Felix Diaz, and the ten days' battle which he has been waging with the federal forces, appeared today to be over.

Throng of men and women and children seemingly gave popular approval to the sudden change of affairs by crowding the big square in front of the national palace and deliriously shouting "Viva" for the three principals and for Manuel Mondragon, who had been conducting the Diaz military operations.

Mexico City, Feb. 19.—The finest irony attended the arrest of Gustavo Madero, the brother of the President, distinguished as a politician, to whose door most of the evils of the administration have been laid. He had invited General Huerta to luncheon at the Gambrianus, a popular restaurant. This was a custom with Gustavo Madero in winning favor. General Huerta, however, had invited guests unknown to his host. In a room adjoining he had stationed a detachment of Chapultepec Park guards. All were preparing to take their seats when at a signal from Huerta the officer in command entered, pointing a pistol at Madero, he announced that he was under arrest. At the same moment, soldiers filled the room, clearing it of all except the principals, Gustavo loudly protested against this indignity, but General Huerta replied in a loud voice, condemning the Madero family.

WASHINGTON, Feb. 19.—Simultaneously with the arrival of the American battleship Virginia at Tampico, Mexico, there was a wave of anti-American feeling throughout the city

and many hostile demonstrations, Americans and other foreigners are apprehensive of trouble. Consul Miller reported to the State Department that Governor Guerra, who led a successful federal onslaught on the rebel forces, seems responsible for a widely distributed circular attacking the United States and calling upon the people of the State of Tamaulipas to rally to the defence of their country. The circular, after being issued, was withdrawn, but not before a feeling of resentment against Americans had been aroused.

WASHINGTON, Feb. 19.—It is not expected that the United States will be in haste to withdraw its battleships and cruisers from Mexican waters. The problems of reconstruction which Mexico must now face will require some little time to inaugurate and the presence of United States warships will serve as a reminder to all elements that American life and property must be protected. The 2,000 marines under orders to sail for Guantanamo, Cuba, probably will proceed to their camp there. In the event that their services are not needed in Mexico they can participate to advantage in the manoeuvres of the Atlantic fleet now within a few hours run from the Gulf Mexico.

General Huerta was described by attaches of the embassy as a stern soldier of the type of former President Diaz, a man of great personal bravery, and a friend of the elder Diaz. On account of his long service and bravery, it was said he was popular with the army and well known throughout the republic. Felix Diaz, leader of the revolution, and General Huerta also had been good friends before the Madero conflict arrayed them in opposing camps.

MEXICO CITY, Feb. 19.—The demonstrations of the night, were not without serious disorders. Marco Hernandez, a brother of the Minister of the Interior, Rafael Hernandez, was killed in the streets by rurales when he refused to cry "Viva Huerta." A demonstrative crowd surrounded him and insisted that he join in the shouting, but he defiantly replied: "Viva Madero." He was answered by the pistols of the rurales, whose bullets killed him instantly.

Henry Ridgewell

There passed peacefully away January 28th 1913; at the home of Arthur Ridgewell Plaster Rock; another of the old time workers in the person of Deacon Henry Ridgewell. For some time his health had not been of the best, finally seized with a paralytic stroke, died after a short illness.

Born in England ninety-four years ago, he came to this country when but a very young man and settled at Little River, Sunbury County. He was not long in this country before he became a member of the Baptist Church. In his own quiet way he constantly availed himself of opportunity to speak to others of Jesus. In the general activities of the Church he with his wife took a leading part, and they were relied upon as most faithful workers.

About thirty years ago, Mr. Ridgewell with his family, came to Plaster Rock, where he has made his residence ever since. This country at that time being practically new, he labored against disadvantages. Since that time he has taken an active part, not only in church work, but in the public interest of his country.

He was a strong believer in organizations, being a member of The Loyal Orange Association for over sixty years. He leaves to mourn their loss his sorrowing widow, whom he married sixty-eight years ago; five children, twenty-six grand-children, forty-three great-grand-children, besides a large circle of friends and relatives. Funeral took place at the home of his son, Councillor Arthur Ridgewell, Thursday afternoon. Service was held at the United Baptist Church, of which he was a member, acting for some time as one of her Deacons. This office he held for over thirty years including the U. B. Church at Arthurette.

The students of the Advanced Department of the day school marched in procession from the house to the Church, which showed a great respect for one who was so dearly loved by the student body. He acted as janitor of this school for several years. The children did not know him as Mr. Ridgewell but as "Grandpa", which was a proof of their love and respect for him.

Services were conducted at the house and Church by Pastor, C. S. Young, assisted by Rev. Mr. Whiteside (Methodist). The funeral sermon was preached from words found in II Timothy, 4th Chapter and 7th verse. "I have fought a good fight, I have finished my course, I have kept the faith." These words were very fitting for one who had been a very active christian for over sixty-nine years.
