

A Simple House Dress.

The house dress has entirely supplanted the wrapper as an indoor garment for most women. The design herewith depicted is of the simplest. The waist is of blouse outline, plain at the upper part and gathered at the waist line. The closing laps a little to one side, and this may be turned back and faced in the style of a revers if desired. The skirt has three gores and is attached to the waist at the belt line.

All the soft cotton crepe weaves, the soft finish ginghams, the ratines and such like may be used for this dress.

The dress pattern, No. 6182, is cut in sizes 34 to 42 inches bust measure. Medium size requires 5 1/4 yards of 36 inch material, with 3/4 of a yard of 27 inch fabric to trim as shown.

There are a number of things about the filling of a silo that must be learned by experience. One of these is to set the blower as nearly perpendicular as possible, so that the wind will come from below and push the silage up. If the blower is allowed to slant the silage will settle on the lower side, and the wind will blow over it without disturbing it.

A hen that begins to lay in November and lays even as many as ten eggs a month through to the end of February, at the prices that prevail in any town, has paid for her feed for a whole year, and all she produces the remaining eight months of the year is clear profit.

## Building Curious Ship.

London, Sept 11—According to the Paris correspondent of the Daily News an extraordinary craft is being completed under one of the archways of the Pont St. Michael, on the Seine. With the greatest mystery, two men are working on the construction of the model of a cylindrical, bottle-shaped vessel, which, they believe, will carry them across the Atlantic at the rate of a hundred miles an hour. The vessel is of wood and tarred cardboard, with strong hoops of iron. It is about 30 feet long by 7 1-2 feet across. There is a manhole at each end.

The master of this curious craft is turned 70, and wears a blue suit with no shirt underneath, and no shoes on his feet. His long curly hair has evidently known no barber's shears for many a long year, for they reach to his shoulders and mingle with his patriarchal beard of snow white. The old man is a Greek, Constantine Panejotti by name. His father was a business man and left a comfortable little fortune, which the son devotes to alleviating the sufferings of his less favored compatriots. M. Panejotti wants are few. He lives on crust-dried vegetables, and boiled water with no salt or butter. He spends most of his spare moments in prayer. His only assistant in his work on the Seine is a young workman.

"The craft now in the slip," M. Panejotti remarked to a representative of the Petit Parisien "is only a model. Later on I propose to build another measuring 325 feet, and driven by three 15 horse-power motors, which will develop a speed of 100 miles an hour.

"The secret of my invention lies in the action of the propellers, which will enable my bottle to revolve on its own axis at a dizzy rate. The persons inside will be on a floor fitted with rollers, which will remain completely stable. My pupil and I intend to go from Paris to Havre and thence to New York."

"My boat," he added, "has no keel. If by a shock or any other cause a leak is sprung, a stroke of the propellers causes it to turn upside down and a leak can be repaired without the least danger."

### Deserted Country Churches

Now the automobile is held accountable for "the decline of the country church." The pastors in session at the State Agricultural College of Kansas report that in that State there are one thousand "abandoned and deserted country churches." The explanation is that the farmers who own automobiles go to the city, where they find pipe organs, good choirs and comfortable pews.

This is a variation of the assertion made a few years ago that the rural churches were neglected because the farmers took long rides on the bicycles Sundays. Then they were accused of being more interested in sprockets and tires than in worship; nothing was said about attendance at city churches. Is it certain that the farmers who ride in their automobiles Sunday go to distant churches? City pastors are not commenting upon any unusual attendance from the country.

### Blood Pressure

Physicians have, says Youth's Companion, always studied the pulse, because it gives valuable information concerning the body's condition of health or disease; but it is only recently that they have begun to use the term "blood-pressure" frequently, and to regard the amount of that pressure as of great importance. That is because they now have instruments for accurately measuring the pressure, which previously they could only estimate by feeling the pulse.

Blood-pressure, or the degree of tension of the blood current within the arteries, is chiefly significant because a permanent increase in it is quite sure to be followed in time by hardening of the arteries, and by the degeneration or disease of important organs, especially the kidneys.

The blood-pressure is increased by a number of causes that increase the force of the heart-beat, or contract the smaller blood-vessels. Any excitement—anger, joy, fear, "nervousness"—raises it temporarily; but that is of little importance unless the emotion is frequently repeated, or unless the person already has diseased arteries. The blood-pressure that is permanently high is more serious. That comes from long-continued mental excitement, such as worry, business anxiety or political strife, or from the action of certain poisons that are formed in the system, and not properly excreted.

### Headache and Ear-Ache

Too often, under the mistaken idea that these are part of the first set, parents allow them to decay unheeded, until it is too late to do anything but extract them.

### GOOD ROADS.

Maine is seriously grappling with the question of good roads. The legislature agreed to the issue of bonds to the amount of two million dollars, for the construction of roads, and to the appointment of a highway commission to carry on the important work. The commission has been named, and the work will soon be commenced. It is expected the money will make eight hundred miles of good roads in the State.

### Oil for Motor Power in British War-Ships.

The British torpedo-boat destroyer Hardy, recently commissioned at Portsmouth, is the first British warship to be fitted with an installation of internal combustion engines with oil as the basis of power.

The Hardy has two sets of Parsons turbines for high-speed steaming—32 knots is the designed rate—but for cruising work each propeller shaft is driven by a Diesel motor, the speed attainable by this means being between 12 and 15 knots.

Eight oil-carrying ships are under construction for the naval service, and six of these will be driven exclusively by Diesel engines.
