Painless Extracting a Specialty

When rugs show a tendency
to curl at the corners, sew an L
shaped piece of buckram to the
under side.

To remove iron rust from
clothing, damp the spot, rub on
cream of tartar and place the
garment in the bright sun for an
hour. If the spot has not entirely
disappeared under this treat-
ment, repeat the proceedings.
Usually the first treatment is
sufficient.

New Things in Gingerbread.

Grated coconut scattered over the
top of ordinary gingerbread just
before baking, is "something differ-
ent," and very good.

Mock Cherry Pie.

One cup of cranberries, 1-2 cup of
raisins, cut in halves, 1 cup sugar 1 tea-
spoon of vanilla, 1 cup of water, 1 table-
spoon of flour. Cook all together on the
stove for a few minutes. Bake with
pie crust the same as you would a cran-
berry pie.

Raised Biscuits.

Warm 1 pint milk, add 1-2 yeast cake
1-2teaspoon salt, 1 teaspoon butter and 4
flour enough to mold. Mix in the morn-
ing and mold over in time for supper.

Drop Cookies.

One cup sugar, 2 1-2 cups flour, 2-3
cup milk, 1-2 cup butter and lard, 2 tea-
spoons cream of tartar, 1 teaspoon soda
or use 2 teaspoons baking powder. Drop
from spoon

Wash and scald all the milking uten-
sils immediately after using, and keep
them in a clean place, absolutely freed
from flies. The millions of bacteria
that are conveyed into milk by dirt
cannot be strained or filtered out, and
as they are the sole cause of milk
souring they should be prevented, as
much as possible, from getting into the
milk.

**SOUR MILK FILLING FOR
LAYER CAKE**

Whip half a pint of sour cream
very stiff, add the stiffly beaten
white of one egg and beat again.
Chop very finely a cupful of Eng-
lish walnuts or butternuts (the lat-
ter are especially good) Stir these in
to the cream with a teaspoonful of
vanilla extract and sufficient powd-
ered sugar to render the filling rat-
her sweet. Rightly made this fill-
ing will be found delicious, and, if
preferred, chopped raisins and cit-
ron may be substituted for the
nut.

**Grand Falls Water
Power**

Van Buren, Me.—It is learned here
on what is considered excellent au-
thority that the plans for the develop-
ment for the tremendous water power
at the Grand Falls of the St John
river, about thirteen miles below this
town, are rapidly reaching a head
through the acquisition of the control-
ling interests of the Grand Falls Power
Company by the International Paper
Company.

For years it has been expected that
possibilities of the falls would be put
to some use and the power, which is
said to be second to Niagara in the
east, utilized.

It is expected that plans now under
way will be put into execution in the
near future by the International Paper
Company, said to be in control of
the Grand Falls power. The plans call
for the development of the falls, which
engineers say are capable of producing
in excess of 80,000 h. p. and the erec-
tion of a pulp and paper plant at or
near Grand Falls which will mean an
expenditure of about \$2,500,000.

The purchase of the timber land
holdings of Hon Edward H. Blake, of
this city, for \$1,050,000 during the past
year and of the Murchie timber lands
by parties who are believed to have
represented the International Paper
Company, gives additional strength to
the reports. The Blake lands are lo-
cated in northern Maine on the St
John waters above Grand Falls and
the Murchie holdings are in New
Brunswick.

It is known that the matter of the
development of the falls has been re-
ferred to the International St John
River Commission by the Dominion of
Canada and the United States for a
report and it is quite probable that be-
fore actual work can be commenced
some matters will have to be adjusted
between the United States and Great
Britain by a new treaty as the present
Webster-Ashburton treaty, now in
force prohibits prevention of free and
open navigation of the river to the
seaport at the mouth of the river.

The expenditure of the enormous
sum of money and the proposed de-
velopment means a great deal to this
section and developments are awaited
with interest all along the river.
