### Teachers' Institute

Attendance Was Good, Business

Was Important and Clever Staff of Officers Elected at Meeting.

THURSDAY MORNING.

The thirty sixth annual session of the Carleton and Victoria Counties Teachers' Institute was opened in the Fisher Memorial School building Thursday morning at 10 o'clock. There were 137 teachers present, all of whom, with the exception of three or four, were from this county. It might safely be called one of the most success Institute gatherings ever held in

A very inspiring address was given hy Mr J F Peacock, Provincial Director of Manual Training and Household Science.

The institute next listened to a very interesting address by Mr R P Steeves, Provincial. Director of Elementary, Agricultural Training. Mr Steeves made special reference to the benefits to be derived from the teaching of Summer School of Science to be held in Woodstock next July.

#### THURSDAY AFTERNOON.

On Thursday J Fletcher Peacock, provincial director of manual training, addressed the Institute on the value and necessity of a more practical education to fit the next generation for their future career.

R P Steeves, director of elementary agricultural training, then followed with a very practical and instructive talk on Nature Study and School Gardens.
