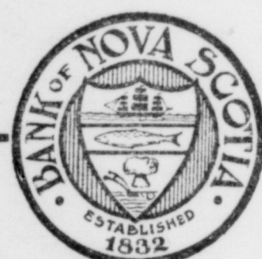
Mrs Rainsford Staples
