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HOUSEHOLD

Chopped Steak.
Put two pounds of lean beef through
a meat chopper; add two level teaspoon
fuls of salt and a saltspoonful of pepper;
mix thoroughly and form into one large
steak. Broil slowly over a perfectly
clear fire or in a hot pan; cook on one
side, then turn and cook on the other for
about ten minutes. Dish on a heated
plate and put over a tablespoonful of
chopped parsley, or serve with tomato
sauce.

Polish Poached Eggs.
Boil one-half cup of vinegar with
one cup of water and break in fresh
eggs, one at a time, and poach them.
Remove to a platter; sprinkle with
salt and pepper. Then add one table-
spoonful of butter and one table-
spoonful of sugar to the sauce; let boil up
and pour over the eggs. Serve on but-
tered toast.

Creole Kidgeree.
Take a cup of cold fish, such
as salmon or codfish steak, left
from previous day's dinner; flake
it and free from bones; one cup
cold boiled rice, one cold hard-
boiled egg (chopped fine), half a
teaspoonful of salt, quarter salts-
poonful of cayenne, a level table-
spoonful of butter, and, if you use
it, a quarter of a teaspoonful
curry powder. Mix well togeth-
er, cook for three minutes, then
serve on thin slices of nicely
toasted bread, buttered.

Stewed Cod.
Fish to be prepared thus
should always be laid on a dish
and covered with a good handful
of salt before it is to be used, as
otherwise it is apt to be tasteless.
Wash off the salt, cut the cod in
slices about an inch thick, and
lay these in a buttered enamelled
baking-dish, and pour over suffi-
cient milk and water to cover the
fish. Add one ounce of butter
to each pound of cod, a little salt
pepper, and nutmeg. Cover the
dish closely, and bake for half an
hour. When ready, slip the fish
on to a hot platter, and keep it
covered and near the fire until
the sauce is made. Pour the
gravy into a small saucepan, add-
ing one or two dessertspoonfuls
of flour rolled in butter, and stir
over the fire until it thickens and
boils. Add a few drops of lem-
on juice or a little finely-chopped
parsley, and serve at once.

The Kitchen Garden

The kitchen garden should, says
Farm, Stock and Home, contain about
an acre, and it should be the most
profitable acre on the farm. In fact,
it should be worth as much as five
acres of corn or wheat. A farm table
without a garden back of it is a
meagre affair. How the wife is handi-
capped when she wants to get a good
meal and how slim the fare is when not
reinforced with fresh vegetables.

Everybody likes peas, and these can
be planted early. The sweet dwarf
wrinkled peas are the best. Plant for
a succession and you have them a
long time. By planting some prolific
dwarfs you save brushing them, which
is an unnecessary nuisance.
You need a succession of sweet
corn. Have some early kind, and for
medium country Gentleman surpasses
them all. Wind up with Stowell's Ev-
ergreen.

In planting beets be sure of getting
the best strain of sugar beets. They
are concentrated food, the best of all
for the table.

Of course you want a good bed of
onions.

You will need a lot of tomatoes.
These you can start in your cold
frame. I have found Stone's Dwarf
or bush tomato very fine. It is early
and bears an immense crop of delicious
fruit.

Greens as a Stomach Cleanser

Greens have, says Farm, Stock and
Home, been called the "brooms of the
stomach." Next to the copious use of
water, spinach ranks first for this
purpose. Probably the best way to cook
it is to boil it thoroughly, drain, hash
it and dress with butter. Dandelions
are ready to eat before they blossom.
They should be very carefully picked
over, washed in several waters, put
into boiling water and boiled hard for
two hours, drained and put into boiled
salted water, to cook vigorously for
another hour. Lettuce is another
healthful dish, especially if dressed
with oil and vinegar. Those having
any tendency to dyspepsia should not
attempt to eat it with the ordinary
American solution of sugar and vine-
gar. "Onions in April and leeks in
May, throughout the year no doctor
you'll pay," is English doggerel but
excellent sense; and it is as well to
lengthen the period of using the pre-
scription by another thirty days.

**Summary of Results of
Experiments With Forage
Plants**

As has been the practice ever since
the work with forage plants was under
taken by the Dominion Experimental
Farms, the principal varieties of the dif-
ferent kinds of forage plants have been
grown during the past year with the ob-
ject of determining their relative value.
During the season of 1913 the tests con-
ducted in duplicate by the Division of
Forage Plants at the Central Exper-
imental Farm and the Branch Exper-
imental Farms and Stations throughout
Canada consisted of 11 different varie-
ties of Indian corn, 19 varieties of tur-
nips, 13 varieties of mangels, 6 varieties
of carrots and 3 varieties of sugar beets.
The work with leguminous forage plants
and grasses including alfalfa and clover,
consisted of breeding for increased hardi-
ness, breeding for high yielding strains
of a superior quality, and experiments
with timothy, orchard grass, western
rye grass and some wild grasses. In
order to place the more important re-
sults of the season's work before the
public in a summarized form, bulletin
No. 76 has been prepared by M. O.
Malte, Ph.D., Dominion Agrostologist
and the Superintendants of the Branch
Experimental Farms and Stations. This
bulletin of 34 pages is available to
all who make application at the Publica-
tions Branch, Department of Agriculture
Ottawa.

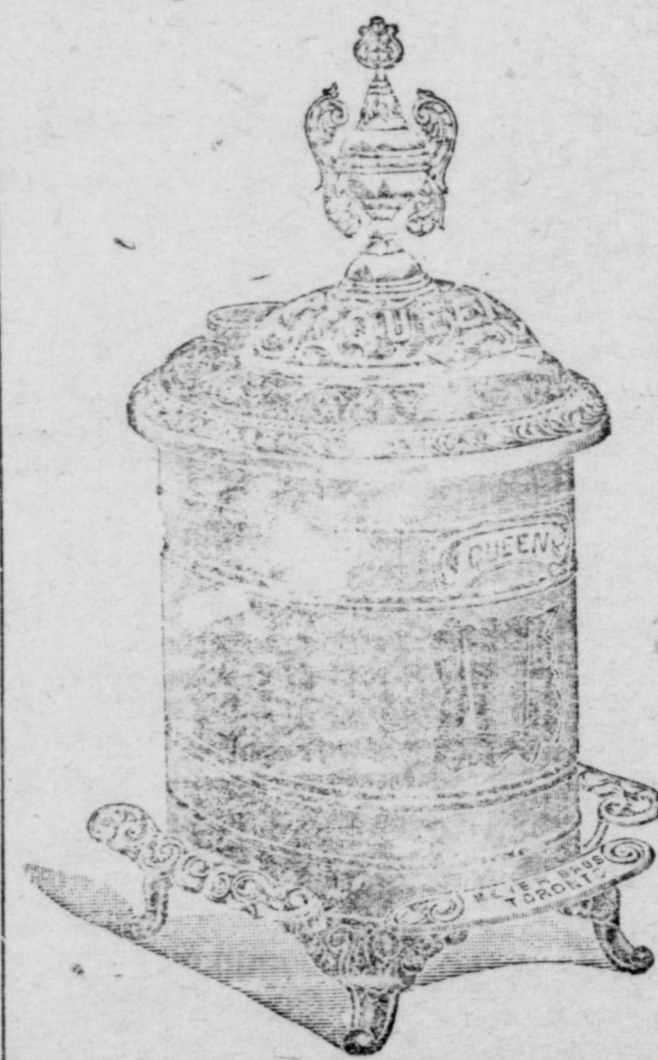
