Death Of Former Governor General

The Duke of Argyil, son-in-law of the late Queen Victoria, and former Governor-General of Canada, died on Saturday at East Cowes, aged 69.

John Douglas Sutherland Campbell was the ninth duke in the succession. In 1871 he married H. R. H. Princess Louise, forth daughter of Queen Vic. 11.35 a. m. From Aroostook Junction. toria. It was as Governor-General of Canada, a post he held from 1878 to 1883, that he was best known to Canadians. He published in 1884 Memories of Canada and Scotland, and in 1885 Canadian Pictures, though undoubtedly the best known of his literary productions was the Life and Times of Queen Victoria, which appeared in 1901.

The successor to the title is Lord Archibald Campbell, a managing partner in the great banking house of Coutts & Company. He was born in 1864 and married Janey Sevilla, daughter of James Callander. Her mother was a famous beauty. The new duke was educated at Edinburgh Academy, Eton and Gottingen. Germany. He entered business life in 1864 and is the author of several works of family records and Celtic lore, notes on swords from the battlefield of Culloden and on Highland dress and armaments.
