Panned Oysters.

Wash quickly in cold water
and drain; throw dry into a hot
fryingpan and shake about until
they boil; then add a generous
tablespoonful of butter and seas-
oning of salt and pepper, and
serve in heated dish with brown
bread and crisp celery.Oysters Broiled and Served on
Toast.First drain off the oyster liqu-
or and boil and skim it clear.
Add butter, salt and paprika to
season; keep hot while oysters
are broiling. Place large oys-
ters side by side in a well-greas-
ed double broiler of fine wire.
Broil on both sides over a very
clear hot fire, so as to brown
delicately without drying all the
juices from the oysters. Throw
them at once into the prepared
sauce and serve on buttered toast
on a hot dish; garnish with par-
sley and lemon.

Cooking Suggestions.

Left-over biscuits, split open
buttered, spread with grated
cheese and browned in a quick
oven, are appetizing.If half a teaspoonful of baking
powder is added to the milk
used in preparing mashed pota-
toes, they will be fluffy and
light.After a chicken or turkey has
remained in the oven an hour,
remove and cover it all over with
a thin, wet clean cloth and finish
roasting thus basting through
the cloth. The result will be an
unusually moist and tender bird.When mixing muffins, gems
or any bread that does not re-
quire kneading, put all of the dry
ingredients together in one bowl
and all the wet ones in another;
then stir them into the dry. If
there are eggs used, fold the
beaten whites in last.

Cocoanut Pie.

Four tablespoons of sugar,
two cups milk, one fourth cup
cream, two tablespoons corn
starch, two eggs, one-half of a
cocoanut and one-half teaspoon
vanilla. Grate the cocoanut,
scald the milk, beat the yolks of
the eggs light with the sugar,
add the corn starch, and mix
with the scalded milk. Cook
and stir this mixture until it
thickens, then remove from the
fire, add the cream and cocoanut
and put away until cool. Beat
the whites of the eggs to a stiff
dry froth and add to the custard
with the vanilla. Bake the bot-
tom crust, brush it over with
the white of egg, pour in the
custard and brown in a quick
oven. Let the pie cool before

Alleged 'Bath Tub Trust' In Canada

MONTREAL, April 2.—The disclo-
sure of an alleged 'Bath Tub Trust'
in Canada, whereby prices on enamel
ware were to be raised 15 per cent and
kept there, was disclosed to-day.It is claimed that the Amherst Iron
Foundry, at Amherst, N. B., the Stand-
ard Ideal Company, at Port Hope, Ont.,
and the Standard Sanitary Co. of Toron-
to, the only three firms manufacturing
such ware in Canada, are the instigators
of the trust.Thirty large jobbers joined these
firms in a plan to increase the prices
on bath tubs, lavatory equipments, and
similar goods in Canada 15 per cent.
The duty on imported goods of this
character is 35 per cent., and it is al-
leged the jobbers agreed not to sell any
imported article at a lower price than
that agreed on for the Canadian make.It is further alleged that the collected
sums obtained from the increase in
prices was to be pooled and divided
among those in the agreement.
