Bible Society Meeting

The fourth annual meeting of the United New Brunswick Auxiliary of the Canadian Bible Society, was held in the United Baptist church last Wednesday afternoon and evening.

At the afternoon session the secretary's report showed a most satisfactory financial condition, the net increase over last year being \$1,000. The treasurer reported \$7,500 on hand, \$5,000

was ordered paid to the Bible Society and \$1,000 to the book account.

Plans were considered for the erection of a bible house in St John to cost \$15,000. Judge Forbes reported \$5,000 from the parent society towards the project. The election of officers resulted as follows:

Rev George Harrison

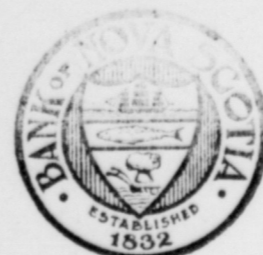
On Wednesday morning word was received in this city of the death at Cambridge, Mass. of Rev. George Harrison a retired Methodist minister of New Brunswick and P. E. I. Conference, and father of Mr. S. L. T. Harrison, of this city, Mr. Harrison, junior immediately left for Cambridge to attend the funeral services. The late Mr. Harrison was one of the oldest ministers on the retired list, being in his eighty-fourth year at the time of his death, which was due to old age. Besides his wife, who was formerly Margaret Tilley, a sister of New Brunswick's great statesman, Sir Leonard Tilley, Mr. Harrison leaves three daughters and two sons to mourn their loss. The daughters are Mrs. (Dr.) Glendinning of Manchester, Mass; Mrs. (Dr.) Yorkston of Sawyerville, Quebec; and Mrs. Johnston wife of the Rev. Hammond Johnston, reputed one of the most able present day men in the N. B. and P. E. I. Methodist Conference. The sons are Hugh, Principal of one of the Chatham, N. B. schools, and Charles, jeweler and optician of Cambridge, Mass.

Rev. Mr. Harrison has been on the retired list, for some years and although long a resident of New Brunswick, he has been living for the past year and a half in the United States.—Moncton Transcript.

Automobiles in New Brunswick

The number of cars registered in the province during the year 1913 was 822, as compared with 600 in 1912, while there were 41 motor cycles registered as compared with 15 in 1912—almost three times as many.

With the increased number of registered cars and motor cycles and licensed chauffeurs there has been an increase in the department's receipts under the Motor Vehicle Law. In 1912 about \$8,400 was received from this source, while last year the receipts will be about \$3,000 more and will pass the \$11,000 mark.

TORONTO BANK CLERKS FORMING ORGANIZATION.

Toronto, Feb. 4.—Over three hundred bank clerks and a number of business men attended a meeting in St. George's Hall last night, for the purpose of organizing a bank clerks' union. The only business transacted besides outlining the objects of the association was the election of Mr. J. P. Buschlen as temporary chairman and the appointing of the entire gathering of bank clerks as a general committee to bring out others to a meeting next Tuesday in the same hall, when the organization work will probably be finished.

Pipes from the Garden

The Boers of South Africa, very carefully guarded calabash seeds, and high prices were obtained, for the gourds to be used for pipes, before the seeds were introduced to other countries. A single African calabash vine yields as many as thirty or forty gourds. Care has, of course, to be taken to train the fruit into pipe shapes, and this is done by laying them during the growing period on small boards, manipulating it so that the gourds harden evenly. Taken when young and pliable the stem of the gourd can be trained into any pipe shape desired. Calabash pipes, as sold on the market, are, of course, fitted with fancy fittings, and the bowl is either made of meerschaum or plaster-of-Paris.

SMALL RACING STABLES

Only if Owner Has Good Horses is Game Profitable

"Is racing profitable?" The question was put to a well-known turfman at Latonia. "It is and it is not," said he. And then he explained: "By that I mean the game is worth the candle if one has a small stable of good horses, and can win one race a week; otherwise it is a hard fight to make both ends meet. Racing in Kentucky is more profitable to-day than it has been in many years, and the members of the racing commission are to be thanked for that. They have compelled the various tracks to hang up larger overnight purses, and a man does not need a stake horse to win a purse now and then. However, there are not many owners getting rich. Those who maintain big stables and frequently are at the top of the list of winning owners are not always big winners on the season, and in some cases I have known such owners to be heavy losers. The majority live from day to day, and some constantly are fighting the feed man. It is a wonder how some owners with one or two horses, that win about one race a year get along. They travel from one track to another, year after year, and few of them look as if they were starving. It is a fascinating game. If a man is looking for a life of ease and not inclined to worry where he will get his next meal, the turf is the place to enjoy this idea of life."
