**Howard Jackson**

One of the best respected and most widely known inhabitants of Wilson's Beach passed away on Tuesday last, Jan. 20th., in the person of Howard Jackson. **Headache Powders**

(Toronto Globe.)

The Inland Revenue Department has issued a bulletin which will serve to call attention to the danger attendant on the common use of various headache powders now on the market. When these are not worthless they are harmful or dangerous, and the official analysts have taken pains to point out the need of greater caution on the part of the public. Of 171 samples examined only eight were found to have been compounded in contravention of the Pharmacy Act, the violation of the law being a failure to disclose on a label the restricted drugs contained.

The effective drugs used in headache powders are acetanilide and phenacetin, and their effect is to depress the heart action. The involved danger of injurious results in counteracted in some cases by including a stimulant in the formula. The Proprietary and Patent Medicines Act provides that when acetanilide is present in quantity above two grains to a maximum dose, or phenacetin in quantity above five grains, the fact must be set forth on a label. As the limit of dose of acetanilide prescribed by the British pharmacopoeia is from one to three grains this requirement is obviously necessary, and not unduly restrictive. About eighty per cent of the acetanilide powders examined contained less than four grains to the maximum dose, and of the remainder very few exceeded six grains. This record shows how dangerous is the practice of taking such powders, especially of increasing the dose beyond prescribed limits.

The report condemns the pretence that drugs can cure headache, which is not a disease, but a symptom or intimation of disease or derangement. A cure is possible only when the cause is removed or corrected.
