Over twenty thousand meals have so far been provided to the unemployed in Toronto by the Salvation Army. Over five thousand men have also accepted the Army's invitation to sleep on the floor in one of their halls. Destitute families were provided with 275 baskets of food during the month of January and in the same period 1515 pieces of clothing were given away to deserving applicants.
