HOUSEHOLD

To Preserve Rhubarb for a year.—
Rub rhubarb with damp cloth, then
cut into pieces about an inch long and
put into a deep dish. To every 3 lbs of
rhubarb add the same of sugar, 2 oz. of
best whole ginger. Cover dish, and let
stand for 24 hours. Then run syrup of
rhubarb into preserving pan and boil it
for half an hour; then add rhubarb and
boil until it is clear; when transparent,
it is done. Stir as little as possible to
prevent breaking rhubarb; it looks best
whole. This keeps for a year.

Rhubarb Bird's Nest.— Butter well a
deep pieplate, wash the pie plant, but
do not peel it unless it is old. Cut it
up quite fine and fill the dish half full.
Make a batter of one cup of sour milk,
one cup of sour cream, one egg, one
teaspoonful of soda, a pinch of salt and
flour enough to make a stiff batter.
Pour this over the pie plant and bake
half an hour in a quick oven. Eat with
sweetened cream. Other kinds of
fruit may be used in the same way.

Pineapple Bavarian.

Simmer a pint of grated pineapple with
a cup of sugar for ten minutes. Soak
half a box of gelatin in half a cup of cold
water until soft; and then pour over it
half a cup of boiling water, stirring until
the gelatin dissolves; then strain over
the pineapple, adding a cup of sugar. Stir
and set away to cool. When thoroughly
cold and it begins to thicken add a pint
of heavy sweet cream, whipped until it
will stand alone. Stir together quickly,
but lightly, until it is nearly stiff enough
to drop; then turn into a mold and set in
refrigerator for several hours.

Stewed Rhubarb.

Use a silver knife to prepare it. Draw
off the outer fibres and skin, beginning
at the top. Cut the rhubarb into two
inch lengths. Lay it in a fireproof dish,
sprinkle soft sugar over it, allowing
pound to pound. Heap the dish with
fruit, as it will shrink a great deal.

Set the dish in a moderately quick oven
and bake for 30 minutes, or until perfect
ly tender and surrounded by a rich syrup.
If the oven is too hot cover with a tin pie
dish, as the rhubarb must not brown. It
may be served cold, in a glass dish, plain;
or the dish may be lined with macaroons
and filled with the rhubarb.

Chocolate Bread Pudding.

Soak 2 cups of breadcrumbs in 4 cups
of hot milk, melt 2 squares chocolate in
a bowl over the teakettle, add two
thirds cup of sugar to it, and enough of
the hot bread and milk to dissolve the
sugar. Add this to the whole amount
of bread and milk, then add 2 well beat
en eggs, one quarter teaspoon salt and
1 teaspoon vanilla. Turn into a butter
ed pudding dish and bake in a very slow
oven, or steam over gently boiling water
until the pudding is firm. Serve either
hot or cold with whipped cream.

**Huerta's Envoys Will Sail
To-day.**

Vera Cruz, May 11. — Emilio
Ribasa, Augustin Rodriguez and
Luis Elguero appointed by Presi-
dent Huerta to represent him at
at the Niagara Falls peace confer-
ence are clothed with full pow-
ers, nominally, at least, to sign any
agreement of convention.

The Mexican Senate in a resolu-
tion approving President Huerta's
nomination of three commissioners
conferred "full power and ample
authority to judge and counsel to
carry on the business and sign any
agreement or treaty whatever."

Those skeptical of the good
faith of Huerta's participation in
mediation declared that he clothed
his commissioners in broadest pow-
ers to make show of a record be-
fore the world, of having done all
in his power to reach a settle-
ment.

The Mexican papers continue to
make bitter attacks on the United
States. Alleged copies of the Amer-
ican articles of war are being pub-
lished in the capital to inflame the
public. They represent the Ameri-
can military practices as most
cruel. The newspapers also are
still insisting that the United
States is violating the armistice,

E Paso, Texas, May 11.—Con-
stitutionalist headquarters at Juar-
ez to-day were without confirma-
tion of a report from Vera Cruz
that Constitutionalist forces under
General Pablo Gonzales had cap-
tured Tampico. The last advice,
received after midnight, said Gon-
zales had telegraphed General Car-
raza at Torreon that fighting was
still in progress at Tampico Sun-
day afternoon, but that he hopes
"to capture the city within a few
hours." Twenty rebel cannons were
then shelling the Federal fortress

Washington, May 11.—That
Huerta intends to sacrifice the
northern part of Mexico, now in
the hands of the Constitutionalist,
in a final effort to save himself
and preserve the government over
which he presides, is the belief
of A. Ramage, an American busi-
ness man from Monterey, now in
Washington. His informant was a
high Mexican official, who had
just returned from Mexico City.

According to this information,
Huerta intends to concentrate his
troops in the vicinity of San Luis
Potosi, and when in a position to
offer strong resistance to American
forces, he will commit some overt
act which will compel this country
actually to begin hostilities.

Washington, May 11.—Rear
Admiral Howard reported to-day
that the abandoned Federal gun-
boat Morolos was yesterday board-
ed, set fire to, and blown up by
Constitutionalists at Matlan.

The official estimate of the dead
in the recent earthquake on the
eastern slope of Mount Aetna
places the number at close to 200.
