Victoria County Man Injured

Bangor, Me., May 13 h—Michael Finnegan of Rogersville, N. B., Frank Crockett of Brockton, Me., and Romeo Gegare of St. Justine, Canada, were killed and five others were injured by an explosion of dynamite in a batteau on Elm stream, seventeen miles above Moosehead Lake, Tuesday. Owing to the remoteness of the section where the men were engaged in river driving for the Great Northern Paper Company, word was not received here until today, when the report was confirmed at the general office of the company in this city.

The dead and injured have been taken to Seabrook, at the head of Moosehead Lake and Dr. Harris J. Milliken, of this city, with trained nurses, have been sent to care for the survivors of the accident there.

Among the five injured was Arthur Biggar, of Biggar Ridge, Victoria county, who had a leg broken and was otherwise severely injured.

The Provincial Department's ditching machine started its season's demonstration work this week. The machine is now operating at Florenceville and after the work has been completed there will be taken to Victoria County, and work in that and other counties. When the work in the northern counties is finished it is the intention of the department, if possible to have the machine work in the lower St. John river counties.

Spend \$500,000 Around Panama.

Panama, May 16.—Telephone and telegraph facilities are being rapidly extended in the Republic of Panama. In anticipation of a greatly increased demand for lines of communication when the canal is opened. The Department of Public Works recently has ordered 1,800 miles of telephone and telegraph wires, the larger part of the order being placed in the United States. The first new line to be constructed will be to David, the most important town in the Republic outside of Panama City and Colon. The whole expenditure will amount to some \$500,000.

Baccalaureate Sermon

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THE PROPHET'S EQUIPMENT FOR LIFE.

Naturally the primary and initial element in equipment for human service is that already referred to, namely dependence upon the Divine, but apart from and in addition to this fundamental qualification are others. When St. Peter was delivered from prison, the angel instructed him to gird himself and bind on his sandals. Freed by the power of the Divine he must give attention to the internal and outward things, otherwise the power of the Divine within him might be dissipated, or lost to the world. Power is not enough; power must be controlled, directed, utilized advantageously, or, to change the figure, the medium by which the power is transmitted must be considered, or yet further in the language of medicine, the vessel which is to contain and carry away the healing potion, the instrument by which the physician is to remove the cancer must be sterilized. Nor is this latter figure alien to the subject in hand. Indeed this very idea of sterilization at any rate of purity in the instrument used, is present, for when the delegation waits upon Elisha, and he decides on the remedy for the city's affliction, he demands a clean vessel in which to place and carry the purifying salt to the contaminated spring. He said, in the verse preceding the text: 'Bring me a new cruse, and put salt therein.'

The prophet of the Lord must be a new man in Christ Jesus. He must, as a sine qua non in the sphere of religion and of true service as well, put off the old man and on the new. He must see the Lord and see himself. He must in the language of that far reaching and searching figure of our Lord, spoken to Nicodemus be born again, born from above, of water and of the spirit. He must adopt without reserve the theological philosophy in the words: 'Tis Thine to cleanse the heart,

To sanctify the soul,

To pour fresh life in every part,
And new create the whole.

And, moreover, having thus recreated he must study to keep himself uncontaminated, pure, spiritually sterilized for as a messenger and minister of the most High, as a bearer of the vessels of the Lord, he must have clean hands, a pure heart, otherwise his practice will nullify his precepts, and men will say unto him continually this proverb: 'Physician heal thyself,' and they will go on unhealed themselves, and the waters of life will flow on still contaminated. As a preliminary, therefore, to using properly the prophet's power, given of God we must look well to the manner of men and women we are. Elisha, when he would work his miracle of beneficence calls for a new cruse.

In addition to purity of heart, and nobility of life as factors in the prophet's equipment for service in the life of our day, there is demanded of the servant of the Lord an unflinching fund of overflowing sympathy with humanity everywhere.

One of the characteristics sharply marking Elisha off from his great predecessor, is this very quality to which I now advert. The former was a fire-bringer; the latter a life and joy distributor. Beginning his life work as he does in the performance of a miracle for the gladdening of a city and the reclothing of the land with verdure and vegetation, he goes unwaveringly on to the end animated by the same humanitarian and lofty principles. He is welcome in the homes of the humblest. He is a joy-bringer. He is described as "the holy man of God that passeth by us continually." He is a lover of music and the hand of the Lord is upon him while the minstrel plays. He is not a recluse. He is a councillor, a friend, a healer of kings and mighty men; he is one of the lowly, and the woman of Shunem, evidently of the poor out of regard for him in his homelessness has constructed for him a little chamber, wherein he may rest.

He forgives his own and his country's chief enemies when he has it in his power to slay them. He interferes boldly in the highest affairs of state. He stoops to the smallest details of the domestic circle; in a word, he touches life at all points, manifesting everywhere a spirit of the profoundest sympathy, the broadest humanitarianism.

With this virtue of sympathy, the social worker, the prophets and prophetesses of the Lord today must be richly endowed. It is an indispensable part of the equipment of all for service in the world. He must have an infinite capacity for loving the unlovely even; for becoming all things to all men. He must fling away his life in loving, sym-
