HOUSEHOLD.

ATTRACTIVE WAYS OF SERVING ORANGES.

Orange Rice.

Turn one-third of a cup of well washed rice into a buttered pudding dish, add one-quarter pound of sugar, the grated rind of two oranges, one tablespoonful of strained orange juice, and a grate of nutmeg; over all pour one quart of milk. Cover and bake two hours in a steady oven, stirring up well every 15 minutes during the first hour. Serve cold in dainty glasses; garnish with sections of oranges dredged with sugar

Orange Syrup.

To each pint of strained orange juice add the grated rind of one orange and three-quarters of a pound of sugar, the grated rind and strained juice of one lemon; boil for twenty minutes, removing the scum as it rises, strain, bottle, and seal tightly. This is good for cold drinks, and is excellent for use in sweet sauces, and will keep for a long time.

An Orange Delicacy.

The hostess in search of new dishes should try this way of serving oranges: Cut the fruit in half, and with a sharp knife remove the pulp; separate it from the skin and put in a small bowl. Chop fine English walnuts, mix with the orange, and return to the shells; chill them thoroughly, but do not freeze. Just before serving cover the top of the orange with a spoonful of whipped and sweetened cream.

Orange Croutons.

Cut small rounds from puff paste, chill and bake. Spread orange curd between each two, sandwich fashion, sprinkle the top with powdered sugar or water icing. For the orange curd melt two ounces of sugar and two ounces of butter, add the grated rind of two oranges and the strained juice of one orange; when hot add gradually to the yolks of three eggs, beaten thick; stir and cook until the mixture thickens; use hot or cold.

Orange Roly Polly.

Half a pound of flour, two ounces of butter, one teaspoonful of salt, four teaspoonfuls of baking powder, one and a half gills of milk, three oranges cut in slices, one-half pound of sugar, two tablespoonfuls of chopped candied orange peel. Sift the flour salt and baking powder into a basin, rub the butter finely into them, add the milk and mix. Shape in oblong piece, spread with oranges and orange peel and sprinkle with the sugar. Roll up, pinch the edges together, place on a buttered plate in steamer, and steam one and a half hours. Serve with orange sauce. For the orange sauce, mix two teaspoonfuls of cornstarch with one-half pound of sugar, add one pint of boiling water, and cook for 20 minutes, stirring all the time, then add the grated rind of two oranges, two ounces of butter and the strained juice of three oranges. Serve hot.

Restoring Crape

Cleaners ask a dollar and more to restore a widow's crape veil, yet the work can be done at home at a trifling cost.

Place a folded sheet on a table and to it pin the veil carefully and straight; do not stretch it a particle. Dissolve one teaspoonful of granulated sugar in one pint of boiling water; wet a clean cloth with this and lay it lightly on the crape. Have an iron very hot; go over the wet cloth as though ironing it, but do not let the iron touch it; continue until the cloth is nearly dry. Then wet the cloth again and continue the same process until the entire veil has been gone over. The crape will be full of deep crinkles and as crisp as new, no matter how old and flat it was when you began. Small pieces of crape for trimming can be renewed in the same way. The crape should be shaken and brushed to remove all traces of dust before starting the restoring process.

BELIEVED THAT MRS. PANKHURST ESCAPED.

London, Feb. 17.—The police have been watching the house on Camden Hill Square since last week, when a woman disguised to represent Mrs. Pankhurst emerged from the building and was arrested. The real Mrs. Pankhurst had just finished an address to a crowd outside and announced that she was going out to meet them. When a woman came out of the building she was pounced upon by the police, but it soon proved that the police had been duped. Mrs. Pankhurst has not been seen since, and there is now a general belief that she escaped.

Prince Edward Island, Wednesday, enjoyed the calm after Tuesday's snow storm, the worst since the winter of 1905. The wind reached forty miles an hour and traffic was at a standstill Tuesday, roads being blocked and railways tied up. No trains moved Wednesday, and only one train got through after hard fighting with drifts, in some places fifteen feet high.

TWO SERIOUS DEFEATS FOR HAITIEN REBELS.

CAPE HAITIEN, Feb. 19.—Two serious defeats were inflicted to-day on the armies of the rebel leader, Senator Davilmar Theodore at Grande Riviere, fifteen miles from here and at Limbe to the west of Cape Haitien.

General Paul, commander-in-chief of the rebel forces, was killed in one of the battles. The rebels retreated toward Cape Haitien pursued by the government troops. Fortifications have been erected here by Senator Theodore, who refuses to leave.

POPE'S ORDER TO STOP EMIGRATION OF PRIESTS.

ROME, Feb. 19.—Pope Pius issued an order yesterday prohibiting the emigration of priests to America without the sanction of the Congregation of the Consistory. This special authorization is to be refused when the motive of the trip to America is speculation.

WILL NOT HOLD NAVAL MANOEUVRES THIS YEAR.

LONDON, Feb. 19.—The Daily Mail learns that from motives of economy the Government has decided to hold no naval manoeuvres this year.
