## HOUSEHOLD.

### Chocolate Rice Pudding.

Make a plain rice pudding with a quart of new milk, two tablespoonfuls of rice, three tablespoonfuls of sugar, about half a cup of raisins, a little grated nutmeg and either two squares of grated chocolate, or quarter of a cup of cocoa melted in a little hot milk. Bake very slowly, same as you would the plain pudding, stirring it frequently until about done, then let it brown nicely on top. If it is to be a party dinner serve whipped cream, iced or plain, with it. If for a home dinner serve flour pudding sauce, flavored with vanilla, with it for a change from the usual milk. Do not have it too thick, but just the consistency of rich custard.

### Shrimp Salad.

The shrimps, either canned or fresh cooked, can be broken in flakes and mixed with an equal portion of hard-boiled eggs that have been put through a ricer. They then can be dressed either with mayonnaise or French dressing. Best of all the shrimp alone can be served on lettuce with either kind of dressing.

Another good salad calls for a cupful of shrimps, cut in small pieces, half a cupful of celery hearts diced small, and seasoning of pepper and salt. These ingredients should be mixed with half a cupful of mayonnaise and placed in a bed of white lettuce leaves. Garnish this salad with eights of hard-boiled eggs, capers and olives. Another good combination is shrimps and chilled, sliced tomatoes, served with mayonnaise on lettuce. For salad should be chilled through and thoroughly dry.

### Caramel flavoring.

Caramel flavoring is easy to make and delicious for flavoring ice creams, pudding sauces and other dishes. To make it brown together, two tablespoonfuls of sugar and one of water. Stir constantly and when a rich red caramel is produced add milk or water boiling hot to it. If the water or milk is cold, or only luke-warm when added the caramel will break into brittle pieces. Maple sugar caramel imparts an extremely delicate flavor and is only suitable in ice cream or similar dishes.

## Facts Worth Remembering.

Ink and iron-mold may be taken out by wetting the spots with milk, and cover with common salt. This should be done before the garment is washed.

A new tooth-brush should be soaked in cold water for twelve hours before being used, then if there are any uneven bristles they must be cut off, and the brush must be dried thoroughly before being used.

Rust stains can be removed from linen with lemon juice. Saturate the stained part with the juice, cover the damp part with fine salt, lay the garments out in sunshine till dry, and then rinse well in clean cold water.

Always inspect corn closely, whether whole or cracked. Moldy corn is a frequent cause

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of mortality among fowls and acts about the same on their systems as ptomaine poisoning in humans.

Simply because an egg is fer-  
is no guarantee of its hatching out a chick. Weak germs cannot hatch, and this weakness, being caused by the hen being out of condition, may cause the chick to die in its shell. A hen may be in good condition to-day and in a bad state to-morrow.
