On Tuesday, Archie Hodgson, of Woodstock, while engaged in repairing the C. P. R. water tank at Upper Kent, fell inside the tank and sustained a fractured arm, severe contusion of the brain and other injuries. He was taken to Woodstock on the accommodation train, accompanied by Dr. Curtis of Hartland. He remained unconscious until Thursday, and his condition is such as to cause his physicians and friends much anxiety.

Edward B Winslow.

The death of Edward B. Winslow, youngest son of Mr. and Mrs. A. F. Winslow, occurred at the home of his parents, Thursday, Jan. 29th., aged 21 years. He leaves, beside his parents five sisters, Mrs. F. P. McAlpine and Miss Alice Winslow, of Birmingham, Alabama, Mrs. A. A. Challenger, Oxford, Ohio, Mrs. H. L. Wallace, Houlton, Me., Mrs. Clarence Hamilton and one brother Randolph Winslow at home.

After graduating from High school he served his apprenticeship in the Sentinel office, then worked for a few months on the Van Buren Times. From the latter position he became a member of the Record staff in Dayton, Ohio. The Record shareholders had such confidence in his ability that in less than a month after his arrival they made him secretary of the company.

He was a member of the Dayton Typographical Union and the Knights of Pythias Lodge. While on the staff of the Record he was offered the position as foreman of the McDowell Times, Keystone, West Virginia, where he remained until failing health compelled him to resign and return to his home, hoping that a change of climate would restore his shattered health.

At the time of the great floods in Dayton, Ted was one of the first to enter the stricken city, and it was there in his efforts to assist in relieving the sufferings of the homeless that he contracted the heavy cold which resulted in his death from tuberculosis. The funeral was held on Saturday, and was largely attended. Services were conducted by Rev. W. H. Jones, pastor of the A. M. E. church. His death removes from our midst a very promising young man of unusual ability and exemplary habits, and many friends will regret his early passing.

Coun. Melville appealed from decision of chair.

Decision of the chair was not sustained.

Motion for re-consideration carried.

Coun. Flemming said his intention was to have Mr. Colpitts dismissed and John F. McLean appointed. The motion for appointment was to come later.

Coun. Perry—What we want to know is, who is in view for the position and if he is competent to fill the position.

Coun. Brittan—To get a man to fill the position better than present incumbent is the object. It is getting more mixed up every year. A younger man is needed for many reasons. Every councillor knows the condition and why not try a change. Surely the temperance element can furnish a man to fill the position acceptably.

Coun. Lamont—I don't know the Mr. McLean who is suggested as Inspector. He lives near the boundary and this should be a recommendation as he must certainly know the conditions. The position is too hard for Mr. Colpitts.

Coun. Estey—So far as Mr. McLean is concerned he is the man we want. He will carry out what he undertakes.

Coun. Gibson—I have good reports from Mr. McLean and I am willing to give him a trial. The business is not run right and we certainly need some change.

Coun. Alex. Bell—I know McLean—he is a good, shrewd and capable man—he will not undertake anything he cannot carry out. The Councillors of Woodstock should not block this matter—they might let us down in a County affair.

Coun. Burtt—We have landed just where we were two years ago. It seems to be felt that the town of Woodstock is always in wrong. The only question is, can we get a man to do better? It seems hard to dismiss Mr. Colpitts—he only gets a small salary.

Coun. Thompson—We better give this new man a trial.

Coun. Stevens—My position is well understood and I don't purpose receding from my position of the past. We do occupy a peculiar position. It is evident that the County wants a change. For six years the town councillors have opposed a change. It will have to be shown that a new appointment will improve conditions. The present Inspector is yet alert and active. The town of Woodstock helps to pay any Scott Act deficit and is certainly interested.

Coun. Melville—The town of Woodstock has rights—when they help pay deficits in this Scott Act they deserve some recognition—and it seems now is the time to improve conditions. No one doubts Mr. Colpitts ability or honesty, but he is 70 years old. The C. P. R. super-annuates men of this age. He did not take our advice but perhaps he is not to blame.

The vote being retaken the following councillors voted for dismissal—Melville, Hunter, Brittan, Shaw, Hemphill, Alex Bell, Flemming, Gibson, Colwell, Moxam, Anderson, Thompson, Estey, Tracy. (15). Dismissal carried.

Coun. Flemming moved, sec. Coun. Colwell, that John F. McLean, of Richmond, be appointed Scott Act Inspector at same salary \$400. Carried.

Inspector Colpitts was heard—He was of age—it being 21 years since he was first appointed—quite a long service. I am taken rather by surprise at this move. I hope my successor will do very much better than I have. I thank my friends who have stood by me and any help I can give in any way, at any time, I will be glad to do so.

In answer to Coun. Tracy the Secty. said it was not necessary to have a constable at a Scott Act hearing, if Inspector was present

Coun. Stevens—I have great pleasure in moving vote of thanks to our reporter Mr. Lynott. Carried.

The Wardens conveyed the vote of thanks to which Mr. Lynott made a suitable reply.

Secty-Treas.—I express my appreciation of your action in increasing my salary. I did not name any amount. I left it to your judgement and I am very grateful for your kind consideration.

There being no further business the session closed.
