## TOWN COUNCIL.

The town council met on Monday night, May 4th. Every number was in his seat and Mayor Jones presided.

The reports of the auditor and town treasurer were read and referred to the finance committee.

The following communication was read and referred to the sewer committee:

Woodstock, April 8th., 1914.  
To Coun. J. F. Allen Dibblee  
Chairman of the Sewer Committee of the Town Council.

Dear Sir,—

Having been promised last year that the question of a sewer to my residence on Connell street, would be considered this spring, I take the liberty of again requesting that an appropriation for the same be put in the estimates this year. It is absolutely necessary that sewers should be laid in front of residence where necessary and modern conveniences are required.

As a resident of this town and a ratepayer for many years, I hope that my request will be granted. It will be not only a convenience to me, but will be in the interests of the health of the town. A street not properly sewered is more likely to be visited with epidemics than one where there is opportunity for all the residents to get rid of refuse in a sanitary manner. Last year I was told that many applications had been in before mine, and therefore, I would have to wait. I am making early application this year so that such a reason may not again be given, and I also consider that this is but emphasizing my application made to the Council in 1913.

Coun. Dibblee referring to the question of sewage said it had been reported to him that several places in town had not been connected and if this is the case the parties concerned should be compelled to do so. I think it is within the power of the Council to do this.

At this stage of the proceedings the Mayor read the following communications and list of names:

In the matter of the application of The Maine & New Brunswick Electrical Power Company lately made to you by its representatives,

I have this afternoon received a partial list of the names of those who have agreed to take stock in a Company to be formed for the purpose of carrying on the electric light and power business in the Town of Woodstock and County of Carleton, a copy of which list I herewith enclose you. I only received this list this afternoon and am unable to give the names of those in the Town of Woodstock who have signified their assent to take stock and join in the said Company, but these can be handed to you later.

I would ask that you take the matter up at once and give your assent to the proposed Company entering upon the streets of Woodstock for the purpose of erecting and constructing the works needful in carrying on the said business.

At the conclusion of the reading Coun. Lindsay moved, seconded by Coun. Flemming, that the request contained in the letter be granted.

Mayor Jones stated the terms of the resolution already passed by the council. Mr. Gould, continued the Mayor, could not guarantee the town certain things necessary before any of the rights of the town were given away. If we pass this resolution, as proposed by Coun. Lindsay, we waive any right to make any terms and recede from the position we have already taken. We didn't want names out of curiosity, we wanted to know with whom we were dealing. Before granting this application we must consider the interests we want to safeguard and we want to get hold of people who are to be, and are of this company, and deal with them. We are not going to ask anything but we must consider the protection of the citizens of the town. The proposed resolution don't safeguard anything. We have simply got a list of names and if action is taken as proposed there is nothing to prevent trunk lines coming in and I am sure no member of this council wants such a condition.

Coun. Dibblee—According to the resolution passed some time ago the company have not carried out our request. We asked for the names of the members of the company, and what is given tonight is a list of names of men who promise to buy stock and we have no one to deal with. This council expected to deal with a subsidiary company and the information asked for has not been given. Why don't Mr. Connell furnish the names of the men in town who want concessions. If we have anything to give away we must get something in return. In our previous experience we never got anything and we better be careful in this matter and get more information before taking action.

I would suggest that the mover and seconder withdraw their motion and move for a committee to consult with the projectors and see what terms can be obtained.

Coun. Lindsay withdrew his motion and then moved that a committee of the whole council meet the promoters in reference to the matter and report. Carried.

Coun. Gallagher said complaints are being made of the excessive speed of automobiles—especially on Richmond street. "Blind corners" should be protected by signs, notifying drivers to slow up. A motion to provide signs for all dangerous places was carried.

Coun. Burden said the operation of the street sprinkler last season was most unsatisfactory and should not be allowed to run on the same lines this year. The matter is important and the citizens want the work done properly and want better results than last year.

It was moved by Coun. Gallagher that Coun. Burden be given charge of the street sprinkling this year.

Coun. Lindsay said the proper thing to do is to ask for tenders to do the work.

Coun. Burden was given charge of sprinkler.

Coun. Jones—There is an agitation going on to move the clocks ahead one hour and it is a "move" in the right direction. It is an economical move and means saving of electricity. The churches and many of the citizens are in favor of it and I can't see why it would not be better all round. I would like the expression of the council on the matter.

Coun. Gallagher—We are far enough ahead as it is — we are now an hour ahead of railway time and ahead of Houlton.

Coun. Lindsay—The time is fixed by law and can't be fooled with, without an act of parliament.

Coun. Jones—Try it for three months, consult the mill owners and manufacturers.

Coun. Flemming—"It will bother the Houlton people and get them all mixed up." The matter dropped with no action taken.

Coun. Gallagher moved that the street committee be authorized to buy a road machine and a mud scraper. Seconded by Coun. Flemming.

Coun. Lindsay—We may need a new road machine but not a mud scraper. If Coun. Gallagher wants to use up

his appropriation this way he will have to reckon with the people.

Coun. Jones—It would be much better and meet with the approval of the citizens if this money was expended on the sidewalks. It would seem that every dollar we can rake and scrape together is going on the streets and people are in danger travelling the sidewalks. The town is liable to be called upon any day to pay damages for injuries owing to the dangerous conditions of the sidewalks. This is a matter of the most serious importance and should be looked after.

The motion to purchase a road-machine was carried.

The motion to purchase a mud scraper was defeated by the following vote:

Yeas—Gallagher, Flemming.

Nays—Burden, Jones, Lindsay.

(Coun. Dibblee was in the chair owing to the Mayor having to leave at 9 o'clock.)

The superintendent of streets was engaged for another year at the same salary as last year.

Council adjourned till Friday night
