Largest Freshet In Years Looked For.

FREDERICTON, May 8.—The St. John River here has reached a higher point than at any time last season and with the weather getting warmer and the rains sure to come soon one of the biggest freshets in years is looked for. Last night the water came up here about eight inches, making a rise of more than fifteen inches in the last twenty-four hours.

FRIDAY EVENING'S SESSION.

Mayor Jones presided at the meeting and all the councillors were present with the exception of Coun. Dibblee.

Coun. Lindsay presented the report of the police magistrate for four months ending April 30. Referred to police committee.

Moved by Coun. Gallagher, seconded by Coun. Lindsay, that a bill of B. Clowes for \$22.22 be ordered paid. Carried. Voted that all bills which have been certified to by the finance committee be ordered paid.

Moved by Coun. Jones, seconded by Coun. Lindsay, that the bill of Chief Kelly for \$10.94 be ordered paid. Carried.

Coun. Burden explained that the above bill was for tickets, meals, etc., in sending back to Fredericton George Ferguson, who in April last arrived in Woodstock without any visible means of support.

A letter was read from the Mayor in reference to a bad curbing in front of his hotel.

Coun. Gallagher—As chairman of the street committee, I must say that Mr. Boyer has a grievance. He paid for the work, the job was not a good one and we should place a new curbing.

Moved by Couns. Lindsay and Burden and passed that the matter be referred to the street committee with power to act.

Moved by Couns. Flemming and Gallagher and passed that the bill of Magistrate Holyoke for \$41.03 be ordered paid.

Voted that all salaries falling due be ordered paid.

Couns. Jones, Gallagher, Lindsay and Flemming discussed the question of saving daylight in an eloquent manner.

Coun. Jones moved that a daylight saving committee be appointed to wait upon the principal manufacturers in town asking if they were willing to turn the clock ahead one hour, and if they answered in the affirmative, the committee to have power to do so, and their action to be binding for the next three months. Coun. Lindsay seconded the motion.

The motion was lost. Yeas, Jones and Burden. Nays, Gallagher, Lindsay and Flemming.

Conn. Lindsay explained that he seconded the motion to bring it before the meeting.

Mayor Jones—If there is no other business, a motion to adjourn is always in order.
