Good Reports from  
Lumber Drives.

Fredericton, May 23.—Guy G.  
Morrison who was in charge of  
John A. Morrison's drive of about  
8,000,000 feet of logs for the St.  
John Lumber Company, arrived in  
Fredericton last evening. The en-  
tire drive will be in the Upper St.  
John corporation limits by Sunday  
all the logs with the exception of  
about 300,000 feet having reached  
a point below which point it is  
handled in sections, before Mr.  
Morrison left there last Tuesday.

All the drives on the Upper St.  
John with the exception of John  
Kilburn's drive of 5,000,000 feet  
for Murray & Gregory, St. John,  
and not more than 500,000 feet of  
F. Chouinard's drive on the Depot  
stream for the Stetson, Cutler con-  
cern at St. John are out. The re-  
port that 2,000,000 feet of Stetson  
Cutler & Company's lumber is  
hung up is incorrect, according to  
to Mr. Morrison, who says that  
about half of a drive of 1,000,000  
feet on Depot stream was left and  
the balance is being brought out.

Late reports are to the effect  
the amount of Randolph & Baker's  
logs abandoned on the Keswick  
stream will be closer to 1,000,000  
than 400,000 feet.

Newspapers have stated that  
Mr. Elwood Burt's drive has  
reached his mill at Cardigan Sta-  
tion, but Mr. Burt states that the  
work of driving lumber from the  
mouth of the branch of the Kes-  
wick, where it was held for about  
two weeks waiting for the Ran-  
dolph & Baker lumber to get by,  
will not be commenced until Mon-  
day.
