Honey Ginger-Snaps.

One pint bees-honey, three quarters
pound of butter, two teaspoons of ginger,
boil together a few minutes and
when nearly cold, put in flour until it is
stiff, roll out thin and bake quickly.

Honey Sponge Cake.

One large coffee cup full of bees-honey,
one cup of flour, five eggs. Beat
yolks and honey together, beat the
whites to a froth, mix all together, stirring
as little as possible; flavor with
lemon juice or extract.

Honey Tea Cake.

One cup bees-honey, one-half cup sour
cream, two eggs, one-half cup butter,
two cups flour, scant one-half teaspoon
ful soda, one teaspoonful cream-of-tar-
tar. Bake thirty minutes in a moderate
oven.

The honey ginger snaps, which were
passed around to the audience, on Fri-
day evening last, after an illustrated
lecture on beekeeping given by H. B.
Durost, B. S. A., in the Agricultural
College, were made in the Domestic
Science Department.

POSSIBILITIES OF RAISINS.

No wonder we talk of plum pudding
and plum cakes when we mean raisin
pudding and raisin cakes. For the
raisins that give these sweets their
names are as good as a plum could be.
Probably Little Jack Horner himself
really pulled a raisin from his Christ-
mas pie and not a plum.

There are two satisfactory ways of
stoning raisins. One is to pour boiling
water over the raisins and let them
stand in it until they are plump and soft
then the stones can be easily removed.
Another way is to keep the hands con-
stantly moistened with very cold water.
This keeps the seeds from sticking and
makes it easy to handle even dry raisins.

The small stoneless Sultan, of course
make this seeding or stoning process un-
necessary, but these have not the size
and flavor of the larger raisins with
seeds in them. Seeded raisins can be
bought that are quite satisfactory for
most cooking.

Here is a receipt for Saultana cake:—
Cream together a half cupful of butter
with the same amount of lard. Rub
these into eight cupfuls of sifted flour
to which a tablespoonful of baking-pow-
der has been added. Then add a cupful
of granulated sugar and a pound of
Sultana raisins, which have been warm-
ed in the oven. Raisins should always
be warmed, by the way to keep them
from sinking. Then add two eggs,
beaten light, and milk enough to make a
batter of proper cake consistency. Bake
in a loaf in a moderate oven. This cake
keeps fresh for a long time.

ECONOMY IN BREAD CUTTING.

A successful boarding house keeper
cuts all kinds of bread and cake in very
small pieces. There is always plenty of
each placed on the dining room table,
and each person can take as many pieces
as are needed. The waste of broken
pieces of bread and cake on the individual
plates is thereby greatly lessened and
the untouched pieces on the serving
plates could be utilized for toast and pud-
ding.

In even a small family this plan might
be pursued to advantage, for it is the
habit of many persons to take a large
piece of bread and eat only a small part
of it.

Three Thousand
Victims Of Storm.

ST. PETERSBURG, March, 19.—
The storm which swept over Russia,
according to a despatch from Boston,
claimed more than three thousand vic-
tims in the territory near the mouth
of the River Don. A fishing settle-
ment of four hundred houses, on At-
chuevsk Spit, was swept away, the
victims numbering at least three thou-
sand. According to an Astrakhan de-
spatch, serious fears are entertained
for the safety of the fishing fleet, and
crews numbering 10,000 men.

BREMEN, Germany, March 19.—An
unknown three masted schooner was
sunk and the whole of her crew
drowned through a collision last night
in the North Sea with the North Ger-
man Lloyd liner Kaiser Wilhelm Der
Grosse. The steamer remained in the
vicinity for two hours, but could not
discover any trace of the schooner's
crew, and she then resumed her voy-
age to America.

The Kaiser Wilhelm Der Grosse left
Bremen yesterday on her first trip
since her reconstruction, as a third
class and steerage passenger vessel.
The captain sent the news of the col-
lision in a wireless message to the com-
pany here.

NAPLES, March, 19.—Professor
Giuseppe Mercalli, director of the ob-
servatory on Mount Vesuvius, was
found burned to death to day in his
bedroom. The professor, who occupied
also the chair of vulcanology and
seismology at the University of
Naples retired to sleep at his usual
hour, and the cause of the fire is un-
known.

Forty women in Illinois lost their lives
in 1913 from pouring kerosene or gaso-
line into stoves to make the fire burn,
according to the annual report of Walter
H. Bennett, State fire marshal. The
total of deaths from fire in the year was
387. The total money lost was \$13,556,-
443, of which Chicago's share was \$5,-
040,353.

Plumage Traffic Cal-
ed Dishonor.

London, March 9.—Pastmaster-Cen-
eral Hobhouse in moving the second
reading of the p. umage bill in the House
of Commons tonight gave details of Lon-
don plumage sales and said that in June
of 1913 plumage was sold representing
about 77,000 aigrettes 22,000 pigeons,
25,000 humming birds, and 162,000 king
fishers. They wished to put a stop to
the traffic which was a dishonor to the
people who conducted it.

It was proposed, subject to one or
two exceptions, to prohibit the importa-
tion into the United Kingdom of the plu-
mage of any wild bird, and to prevent
any person having in his possession or
being concerned in the sale of such plu-
mage. Parliament, he urged, had a
right to insist that a silly, debasing fash-
ion should not be allowed to work harm
to the most innocent and beautiful of
God's creatures. It was a case of the
vanity of women going hand in hand
with the rapacity of man, and he did
not see why the House should not limit
the sphere of their joint mischief. The
second reading of the bill was agreed to.

ANOTHER AMERICAN KILLED IN
MEXICO.

Jaurez, March 17.—Thomas D. Ed-
wards, U. S. Consul, has received word
of the killing of Oscar Allen, American
citizen, at Pearson, yesterday morning
Mr Allen was watchman for the Madera
Company. He was found dead outside
his booth, his head almost severed, ap-
parently with an axe, which was found
beside the body. There were also sever-
al stab wounds on the body. Mr. Allen
came from Corpus Christi, Texas, where
his father, a naturalized German, at
one time was sheriff.

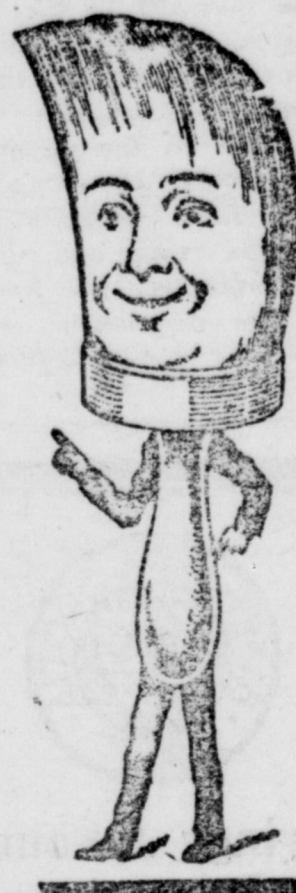
