HOUSEHOLD.

Sour Milk Cookies
One-half cup of shortening, one
and one-half cups of sugar, two-
thirds of a cup of sour milk, two
eggs, one scant teaspoonful of soda,
one-half teaspoonful of nutmeg.
Mix as soft as possible, sprinkle
with sugar, and bake in a quick
oven.

SALAD DRESSING.
Beat together three tablespoonfuls
of mustard, three tablespoonfuls of
sugar, one tablespoonful of corn starch,
one egg. When thoroughly mixed add
one cup of vinegar. Place in a sauce
pan and cook until mixture boils. Re-
move and beat in one teaspoonful of
butter for five minutes.

Peanut Candy
Put two cups sugar in a pan on
the stove and stir until all melted.
Be very careful not to burn it.
Then have ready one cup peanuts
in a buttered pan. Pour the melted
sugar over.

Taffy.
Two cups sugar, one tablespoon
butter, one cup molasses, one-half
cup milk, pinch soda. Boil first
four ingredients until brittle when
dropped in cold water. Take off
fire and add soda; then pull until
light.

Light and Flowers.
Flowers change their color in re-
sponse to light and temperature
variations, Wells found. He ob-
served a nasturtium plant which
showed three types of flower—yel-
low, yellow with red markings,
and claret-colored. Sometimes one
type predominated and sometimes
another. In the off-spring of this
plant he noticed that the parti-
colored and red flowers occurred only
during fine hot weather in the se-
cond week of August, while during
the cold wet periods of July, Sep-
tember and October all the flowers
were yellow. By self-fertilizing the
flowers of different colors he found
that in the second generation the
color of the parental flower had no
determining effect, and he therefore
concluded that temperature and
light were the governing influen-
ces.

USE OF WASTE WOOD.
Waste wood in the manufacture
of school desks is now being used
for the backs of clothes brushes,
according to the statement of the
forest service.

A large manufacturer of school
desks in Michigan had a consider-
able amount of waste material in
sizes which were too short to en-
ter into the manufacture of the
smallest desks, and could not be
utilized further with his machin-
ery or in his line of work. This
material was all hard maple in
pieces an inch thick, a foot or so
long, and about 3 inches wide; for
a long time it had been consigned
to the waste pile and sold as fire-
wood. This waste amounted to
from 1,000 to 1,500 board feet
each day. A nearby manufacturer
was using practically this quantity
of maple, which he was sawing up
into small pieces for making the
backs of cheap brushes.

Members of the forest service in-
vestigating methods of eliminating
factory waste, conceived the idea
that the blocks used by the brush
factory could be readily secured
from the waste of the school-desk
manufacturer, and on this basis got
the two together. Arrangements

New Invention of Orville
Wright.

Dayton, O., Jan 6. — Mr. Orville
Wright has several large surprises
in store for the people interested in
air traffic, according to late reports
from his factory, where he is daily
working upon several new inventions.
By the perfection of the aeroboot,
otherwise known as the hydro aero-
plane, he has brought forward for
the commercial and pleasure use one
of the unique mechanical devices of
the century, and one which promises
to illumine his already illustrious
career. However, this marine aeroplane
is of no more importance than if, in
fact, quite as important as the inven-
tion of the automatic stabilizer,
which will make flying "fool proof,"
and as comparatively safe as trans-
portation by land. It means that an
unskilled operator may make a trip
from Dayton to New York and return
with comparative safety.

"We have invented an automatic
stability device which will revolutionize
flights," said Mr. Wright, yesterday.
"It is more accurate than any aviator
can be and will make flying fool proof
or as nearly fool proof as anything can
be. I have flown many miles with it
and have never touched the controls.
We are now simplifying it. We hope to
see the day when it will be just as
safe to board an aeroplane and make
a long trip, as it is at present to make
this journey behind a locomotive. The
stability device will go a long way,
towards making this dream a reality and
we are enthusiastic about it."
