William Dyck, who carried away in his automobile Krashenko, the Plum Corlee bank robber and murderer of H. M. Arnold, Thursday, at Morden, told on the witness stand the story of his fear-compelled drive with the bandit.

Two candidates for one \$12,000 job as mayor, sixteen for four \$7,500 jobs as controllers, and seventy-five for thirty-one \$1,000 jobs as alderman have filed their nomination papers and deposited each \$200 for the civic elections which will be held in Montreal April 6th.

The Nelson bill, designed to appropriate \$20,000 for the celebration in February, 1915, of 100 years of peace between Great Britain and the United States, passed the New York Assembly Thursday by a vote of 91 to 37.

President Wilson has won the opening skirmish of the greatest battle of his administration when the House, over bitter protests from the recognized Democratic leaders and almost solid minority opposition, adopted a special rule for the consideration of the bill repealing the free tolls provision of the Panama Canal Act. On the first test, a motion to end debate and preclude amendment on the rule carried by a vote of 207 to 176; the rule itself was adopted 200 to 172.

Franz Tannebaum, the leader of the unemployed, on trial several days on the charge of participating in an unlawful assemblage, was convicted Friday in New York. He was sentenced to serve one year in the penitentiary.

Milling Season in Fredericton To Start Next Week.

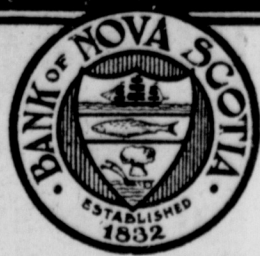
The milling season in and about Fredericton started Monday, Gunter's mill at St. Mary's Ferry being the first of the large mill-hereabouts to start operations.

The date for the opening of operations is an early one this year, and all the mills are counting on a lengthy season. Gunter's mill will run until late in the fall, probably until the river bridges over and will have one of its biggest sawing seasons.

The York and Sunbury Company's mill will start sawing on Wednesday, as previously stated, and the Frasers, Limited, will also start the Victoria mill on Wednesday. Both mills will have a big cut, that of the Victoria mill being probably as much as ten million feet. The Phoenix mills are without logs for early cutting and will have to wait for the drives to come out to get material. The total cut of the mills in Fredericton, Gibson and St. Marys this season will amount to upwards of twenty-five million feet.

The winter's operations in the woods are about completed and the crews are starting to come out from the camps to wait until the stream driving commences.
