MILK STERILIZED BY ELECTRI CITY.

(Women's Journal.)

Milk sterilized by electricity is supplied from the official city milk depots of Liverpool to about 1,000 babies daily. A current of electricity of high voltage is passed through the milk, and it is said that the milk tastes the same as when it leaves the cow. Strict tests show that any tubercular or other contamination is removed.

The babies are visited by women inspectors, who report the results to headquarters. During the last ten years many thousands of infants have been fed from Liverpools milk depot.
