## Mrs MacIntosh.

The death of Mrs. MacIntosh, wife of Dr. MacIntosh, Monday morning, cast sorrow over the whole community and sympathy in large measure is felt for the bereaved husband and son. She was taken ill on Wednesday but dangerous symptoms did not develop until Saturday night. On Sunday Mrs. Rankin of Woodstock and Curtis of Hartland were called in consultation when it was found that the case was quite hopeless.

Death ensued only a few hours later.

Mrs. MacIntosh was a woman held in high esteem by the many with whom she came in contact. A thoroughly womanly wife and mother, she had exceptional ability in other spheres and was by this reason a helpmeet to her husband in more than word. She was born at Port Henry, N. Y., and received her education at Williamstown, Ont., Potsdam, N. Y., and Philadelphia, while most of her young womanhood was spent in Brooklyn. Her mother has been dead some years, while her father, N. R. Remley, lives in Anaconda, Mont. There are four sisters, Mrs. Frank Mansfield, Philadelphia; Mrs. Richard Paulson, Brooklyn; Mrs. J. G. Witherbee, Port Henry, N. Y., and Miss Beth Remley who resides at the home of Mrs. MacIntosh. Besides the sorrowing husband one son Allen aged six is left. She was a communicant of the Church of England.

The funeral was held on Wednesday afternoon, services at the house and grave being conducted by Rev. N. Franquette.

All the sisters and C. E. and Miss Ida E. MacIntosh of Iroquois, brother and sister of the doctor, arrived here for the funeral.

## BELGIAN RELIEF.

Urgent Relief to the Inhabitants of Large Sections of Belgium is Greatly Needed at Once—Canada Will Do Her Share—New Brunswick Must Help.

The Belgian Relief Committee in St. John is prepared to receive gifts of money, food and clothing to be forward to Belgium for distribution by British and Belgian authorities. Cash gifts should be sent to Mayor Frink, chairman and treasurer of the fund.

The committee appeal to clergymen, churches and organizations of all kinds and to private individuals to co-operate with contributions and in organizing sales and entertainments.

A depot for receiving food and clothing has been opened in the new Pettingill warehouse, Water street. This committee will be glad to receive clothing of all description, new or old, for men women and children, blankets of wool or cotton, and food of non-perishable nature that can be transported to Belgium.

Shipments from outside points to the Belgian Relief Committee will be handled by the railways free of charge.
