## HOUSEHOLD

## Vegetable Stew.

One-half cup carrot 1 4 cup  
celery, 1 teaspoonful onion, 3  
tablespoonfuls butter, 1 table-  
spoonful parsley, a few grains  
salt, 1 1-2 cups of potato, 4 cups  
of water, a few grains pepper.

Cut vegetables (except potato)  
into 12-inch dice. Saute in the  
butter till light brown in color.  
Add seasoning, then hot water;  
simmer 1 hour. Add potato the  
last twenty minutes.

## Cream Potato Soup

Two and a quarter cups milk,  
12 ounces potato (1 1-2 cups sliced)  
2 teaspoonfuls onion juice,  
3 tablespoonfuls butter, 3 teas-  
poonfuls flour, 1-4 teaspoon salt,  
paprika.

Boil thinly sliced potato until  
soft. Press through sieve into  
hot milk. Cook until it thickens,  
add onion juice salt and paprika.  
If in the least lumpy strain into  
the cups.

## Tomato Pie.

This is a dish beloved of the  
vegetarian. Skin and slice some  
tomatoes and lay them in a pie  
dish. Sprinkle with salt and pep-  
per and add a little white sugar,  
also a well-beaten egg and half a  
cup of milk or single cream.  
When the pie dish is full put a  
rich layer of paste over and  
bake in a hot oven.

## Tomato Sauce.

This is delicious served with  
chops or cutlets. Take four  
tomatoes, cut them up and put  
into a jar with a few peppers  
and add a small cup of water.  
Cover the jar and let it stay in a  
hot oven until the tomatoes are  
quite soft. Now run them throu-  
gh a sieve into a saucepan and  
add salt and pepper. Simmer  
slowly and serve hot.

One Woman's Experi-  
ence.

An American lady, a tourist  
in Germany when war broke  
out, was caught in the swirl of a  
battle between Germans and  
Russians.

'We could hear the roar and  
see the smoke,' she said. 'The  
sounds kept coming nearer and  
the people began to flee from  
the town. I first thought it  
would be safer to remain in the  
house, but finally the firing got  
so close that I decided to take  
my three children and flee.

'I started on foot with no lug-  
gage, not even a handbag. It  
was the only way. I was so fri-  
ghtened that I do not know  
which way I went, but I walked  
right into the centre of the battle  
right between the firing.

'Several Russian soldiers jump-  
ed out of the trenches and dragg-  
ed my children and myself in  
the trenches with them. Then  
there was nothing to do but to  
stay there. There was a hail of  
shot falling all around us. We  
sat cramped up in the trench all  
night, with soldiers firing on  
each side of us.

'My little boy had been ill.  
He had a fever. The night in the  
trench was more than he could  
stand. He died at dawn on Aug-  
ust 3rd.'

ed. The men were fighting and  
the women had fled. 'I went to  
my brother-in-law's home and  
found no one about,' she continu-  
ed. 'I wanted my boy to have a  
decent burial, so I carried him  
to the undertaker's. There, as  
everywhere else, no one was  
about, but the shop was open. I  
went in and picked out a little  
coffin. Then I laid the boy in it.  
She managed to drag the coffin  
to her brother-in-law's house.  
She had neither the time nor the  
strength left to dig a grave, but  
she scooped out a little hole in  
the yard, set the coffin in it and  
heaped some dirt over it. Then  
she took the two girls and start-  
ed again on foot to flee from the  
battle.

Her memory was not clear on  
many points after this. She walk-  
ed toward the west, she said and  
she and the children slept under  
the stars without food. She arriv-  
ed at Vilna, Russia, on August 7  
and then her four-year-old daugh-  
ter, Orleans, died from ex-  
posure.

'The people were kind to me,'  
she said. Two men helped me  
bury the child in a little cemetery  
in Vilna. I went away and left  
her there.'
