CREAMED CARROTS.

Here is a new way to cream carrots, vouched for by the Youth's Companion: Take eight carrots, scrape and boil them for ten minutes in salted water, a dessertspoonful of salt to every quart of water, and strain them. Cut the carrots in rather thin slices, put them in a stewpan with two ounces of butter, half a gill of water, pepper and salt. Put the cover on the pan, and let the mixture simmer for twenty minutes, shaking the pan occasionally to insure even cooking. When the carrots are tender, add the yolk of one egg and half a gill of cream, beaten together; also half a teaspoonful of chopped parsley. Stir the mixture over the fire until it is thick, but do not boil it after the cream is added.

A TOMATO CONSERVE.

Pare and slice four pounds of ripe tomatoes. Let them stand until the water has run from the fruit. Add three ounces of preserved ginger cut into fine pieces and the juice of one lemon with the grated peel, grated well into the white inner skin. Cook the mixture until it begins to thicken, and add four pounds of granulated sugar. Continue boiling the mass until it is very thick, stirring it continually to keep it from burning. Pour it into glasses, and when cool, cover the glasses with paraffin.

USES FOR SURPLUS MILK.

Surplus milk may be used in many ways, says The Drovers Journal. Skimmed milk answers as well as full milk for soups and doughs when fat is also used. Even if otherwise likely to curdle in heating, the addition of a little cooking soda makes it possible to scald milk, and then it may be used for custards, puddings, etc.

Sour milk is available for doughs and cheese, and cream may be substituted for butter and milk in simpler cakes and cookies. Another method of using sour milk is to strain it, when it is quite thick, into a small muslin bag. Tie a piece of string around the top of the bag and hang it in the air in the shade to drip. At the end of three or more days, according to the quantity of milk used, an uncommonly dainty cheese will have been produced without effort.

UNCOOKED TOMATO CATSUP.

Peel and chop a peck of ripe tomatoes and hang in bag, to drain for 24 hours. Add to the drained tomato four bunches of celery (chopped fine) and one large cupful of chopped onion. Mix the three vegetables thoroughly and then add one fourth cup of salt, one-fourth cup sugar, two tablespoonfuls mustard seed, two tablespoonfuls ground cinnamon, one teaspoonful ground allspice, and two large red peppers, chopped fine. Mix very thoroughly; cover with good cider vinegar, and put in self-sealing cans.

TOMATO MOCK-ORANGE MARMALADE.

Scald and peel large-sized yellow tomatoes. Cut downward over each seed section, press open and remove all seeds with the thumb, leaving the pulp comparatively whole. To two parts of the prepared tomatoes allow one part of oranges, slicing thinly. Cover all with an equal quantity of sugar and let stand over night. In the morning pour off syrup and cook down about half, add the tomatoes and oranges and cook until the orange skins are transparent. Seal in jelly glasses. This is an original recipe, and is said to be a delightful substitute for the genuine orange marmalade, though much cheaper.

WAR NEWS

Rotterdam, Aug. 21—Details of the German occupation, yesterday, of Brussels were received here to-day. Burgomaster Max met the detachment of German cavalry, which entered the city via the Louvain gate. He carried a white flag. The German commander expressed friendliness, and promised if the inhabitants of Brussels made no attempt at resistance that no harm should come to the city or its people. So far only a cavalry detachment has occupied the city, but it is certain that the main German army will be there today.

Despite the pleas of the city officials, residents of Brussels are everywhere displaying the Belgian, French, British and Russian flags.

correspondents found near the German army after last night.

London, Aug. 21—Telegraphic communication between England and Brussels was entirely interrupted to-day, and no despatches were accepted for any place in the Belgian provinces of Limbourg, Liege, Namur, Luxemburg, Brabant or Antwerp, except for the city of Antwerp.

Libau, the Russian Baltic seaport, was badly damaged during its two hour bombardment by a German fleet, according to the captain of a Swedish steamer. The inhabitants were panic-stricken.

German warships are reported to have destroyed the harbor works at Hango, Finland.

Paris, Aug. 21 (6.30 a. m.)—A despatch to the Havana Agency from Rome says the advance of the Montenegrins in Bosnia continues. The despatch adds that Austrian aeroplanes on Wednesday flew over the mountains and dropped bombs on the Montenegrin forts. The bombs, however, did no damage.

London, Aug. 20.—(Montreal Star Despatch.)—The French line from Namur to Dinant and South to Givet, in France is intact. The German attack has not only failed, but the French in force, with immensely strong reinforcements behind and still coming up from France, have crossed the Meuse and are steadily pushing back the right wing of the army of the Moselle and part of the centre. This news allowed to come through from Brussels by the Censor, shows that the German efforts to make headway through the Ardennes region has so far met with no success, and that the situation is hourly growing more unfavorable to the invaders and more favorable to the Allies.

The Germans have been allowed a gap to pass in on the north of Namur. They stepped into the trap. They got as far as Gembloux. Meanwhile the allies have been taking possession on a vast semi circle from Diest to Namur, arriving by Quatre Bras and Wavre. They have been choosing their battle ground. It is not Waterloo this time. That place is too close to possible distraction in Brussels, but it is a splendid field. It is broken ground, veiling the Allies' strength from the enemy. Yesterday the long line of troops on the left bank of the Meuse between Namur and Dinant was drawn gradually in, stiffening up as they came, it is stated. The faces of fields and low hills were alive with moving troops.
