

If we leave out of account Canada, Australasia and India, which are not likely to be affected by the struggle, the great overseas prizes for which the armies are now contending are in Africa. It is in Africa that the colonies of France, Germany and Britain are closest together. Beigium, too, has a yeritable empire in the heart of the Dark Continent, and in the event of the allies being defeated the Belgian Congo would certainly be called upon Old Man's Story of Wonderful Exto salute a new overlord. Locking at the map of Africa, it is to be observed that there are only two black portions upon the whole continent. These represent pure African ownership. Al the rest has been divided among Euro pean countries. Abyssinia and Liberia alone recognize their original owners. Probably ninety five per cent of the whole continent is one of the stakes of which the rivel combinations are now contending.

In its very heart the Belgian Con go, for long the personal property of the King of Be'gium, but now a depend ency of the nation. On the south is British South Africa, including the Transvaal and the Orange State, that came under British authority as a re sult of the last war in which the Mother Country engaged. Adjoining it on the northwest is a territory about the size of Rhodesia which belongs to Germany. 

NEW METHOD OF HATCHING CHICKS

The capacity of the incubator is for eighteen to twenty trays, one under the other; thus upwards of 5,000 aggs fill a single chamber. The trays are so arranged that a blast of warm air circulates through the rows of eggs.

Some of the farms installed with the apparatus can hatch 10,000 chicks every day in the year, and in a single season as many as 20,000,000 lively chicks have been hatched and shipped

antened satisfactorily by bees. An enterprising American, however, has recently combined the two, and with most excellent results. He noticed that the temperature of the beehive was almost the same as that of his incubater, which calculation was confirmed by a thermometer, so he set about to utilize the superfluous warmth of the hive as a egg-hatching establishment, without interrupting the welfare of his bees. Twenty eggs were placed in the upper portion of the hire, ingeniously reparating them 'rom the working apartments of the bees by means of a cotton cloth. The eggs were further protected by 'ittle cushions made of similar material to that of quilts, and left for the requisite number of days required for hatching in the ordinary way. At the end of that time eighteen of the twenty eggs satisfactorily hatched, yielding chicks in every way as strong and healthy as those reared by other means, thus turning the waste space of the beehive to most profitable account.




